The above is an excellent photograph of Countess Czaykowski, wife of the dashing Count Czaykowski, former secretary of the Turkish legation, whose romantic marriage in 1899 to Edith L. Collins of New York, a former ward of United States Senator Depew, was an international society event.

The count was convicted of fraud, and must go to prison for five years. Fortunately for his wife, they separated some months ago, shortly after the count's arrest he was released on bail, and the Turkish government interceded in his case, with the result that the count was permitted to leave France pending the proceedings. The count, who is of Polish descent, is a Turkish subject, and is still in the diplomatic service of Turkey.
