If ever we should have to interfere in the affairs of may of our neighbors it would only be when we found it impossible longer to fewe found it impossible longer to re-frain from doing so without serious damage following; and even in such case it would only be with the sincere and effective purpose to make our interference bene-ficial to the peoples concerned. MAY HAVE TO INTERFERE.

Ing some other strong nation undertake the duty which we neglect; and such neglect would be unfortunate from more than one standpoint. Wherever possible we should gindly give any aid we can to a weaker sister republic which is endeavoring to achieve sta-bility and prosperity. It is an ungen-erous thing for us to refuse such aid; and it is foolish not to give it in a way that will make it really effective, and therefore of direct benefit to the people concerned-and of indirect benefit it us, simply because it is a benefit ing some other strong nation undertake fit to us, simply because it is a benefit to them.

INTERNATIONAL POLICE POWER.

In the last resort, and only in the last In the tast resort, and only in the last resort, it may occasionally be neces-sary to interfere by exercising what is virtually an international police power, if only to avoid seeing some European power forced to exercise it. In short, while we must interfere always cau-tionally and power watcome tionsly, and never wantonly; yet, on rare occasions, where the need is great, it may be necessary to interfere, un-less we are willing to confess ourselves tess we are winning to contess onizatives too feeble for the task we have under-taken, and to avow that we are will-ing to surrender it into stronger hands; and such confession and avowal I know my countrymen too well to believe that they will ever make.

### ORDERS FOR CARS.

Record-Breaking Contracts Are Placed For Railroad Equipment.

Chicago, Oct. 21 .- Under the caption, equipment," the United States Railway Age says: Contracts reported this week show that the high records of 1901 and 1902 that the high records of 1901 and 1902 for freight equipment and locomotives will easily be surpassed before the close of 1905, although the volume of orders in those years was exceptional, and not-withstanding the present high prices and the difficulty in securing prompt deliveries. Orders placed by the Penn-sylvania this week for 21,500 cars, in addition to the 16,160 ordered in August made a new record in contracts placed made a new record in contracts placed by a single company, and practically re-empts all steel car building facilities during the entire year of 1906. It is stated that all car manufacturers are crowded with orders and that one company alone has unfilled contracts aggregating over 60,000 cars, while no company can promise delivery before the middle of next year, unless the order is for a few wooden cars. Orders for freight cars for the first 41 weeks of the current year are in ex-cess of any previous year, while the contract for passenger cars and locomotives, if continued at their present rate will also exceed any previous record.






## CITY'S HEALTH REPORT.
