THE CRIME OF INGRATITUDE.

How the Reverend and Other Knockers
Look in the Limelight of Facts
—Worth Reading.

The reading matter in connection with this map said, "that falsehood, perfidy and murder were not crimes if committed at the behest of the Mormon hierarchy, and Mormon children are taught this but fealty for all loyalty to the nation which, as they are carefully instructed, are the abode of the prophets' skirts." What makes the above more ridiculous is, they said it was proven at the Smoot investigation, knowing that but few people outside of Utah read those proceedings. For all of the above standers, and falsehoods, we hold the Rev. Bruce Kinney, superintendent of the Baptist mission of Utah and Wyoming, responsible.
