Barnes Acquitted—The Cable

Fleet—With Appeal

NEW YORK, 20.—In the Barnes

trial the case was submitted to the

jury without argument on either

side. The Judge charged that the

proof of malice was necessary to

convict and the jury, after a brief

consultation, brought in a verdict

of acquittal, the jurors at the same

time handed a written statement

to the court to the effect that while

the defendant was legally exempt

from conviction, yet they believed

that the printed matter in the ar-
ticles relating to the deceased Mrs.
Barnes was atrocious and cruel.

A Rye Beach dispatch states that

the direct U. S. cable fleet, Far-
aday, Dana and Ambassador, were

in harbor at De Grace, Newfound-
land, on the 12th, waiting for suit-
able weather to complete the lay-
ing of the cable.

A formal order in general terms,

affecting the order of Chief Judge

Nelson at the special term, deny-
ing the application of defendant

for a bill of particulars in the suit

of Tilton against Beecher, was

signed by Judge Reynolds this

morning. It affirms Judge Nel-
son's order and every part thereof.

Beecher's counsel will appeal from

the general term to the court of

appeals.

New Republican Organization.

BOSTON, 20.—The prominent Re-

publicans of this State have orga-
nized a commonwealth club, with

E. R. Hoar president, Henry L.

Pierce, Richard Olney, John Q.

Adams, and W. F. Phillips vice-

presidents. The preamble to the

constitution recites that the mem-
bers, dissatisfied with the corrup-

tion which now prevails in poli-

tics, are convinced that this dis-

satisfaction is not confined to any

political party or section of the

State, but is shared by all honest

men, and that a better govern-

ment can be secured by the union

of all those who hold these op-

inions, and that an interest in all

public measures will be excited

among those who now stand aloof

through apathy and distrust. It

does not give a pledge, nor aban-

don the organizations to which

they now belong, but says, "We

know that the honest and patri-

otic men of this State are in the

public life are of equal importance

to all parties, and that nothing is

more necessary than that private

citizens take an interest in the

public life, and that the intelli-

gent interest in public affairs."

Will Not Recognize Smith.

WASHINGTON, 20.—The cabinet

session to-day continued nearly

three hours. All the members ex-

cept Postmaster General Jewell

were present. Secretary Seward

presented a subject of comment

on the subject of comment. At-
torney General Williams submitted

the telegram from Senator Clay-
ton and several State officers urg-

ing the recognition of the Smith

party by the federal government,

but the general opinion of the

cabinet was that since their last

meeting nothing had occurred to

alter the decision made at that

time, the government has in its

possession no such information as

would justify any interference with

the controversy in that State.

Governor Garland of Arkansas,

telegraphs his counsel here, to-day,

from Little Rock as follows: "All

TURKEY.

Satisfaction Promised.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 20.—Baker,

Minister of the U. S., recently re-

ceived information that the resi-

dence of American missionaries in

Latatia, Syria, was violated by

armed forces, he at once called up-

on the Grand Vizier and had a long

conversation with him on the sub-

ject of the outrage. The Grand

Vizier said he was waiting for a

report from the Governor of Syria,

and could take no action until that

was received, but he promised most

positively that the Porte would give

the U. S. government full satisfac-

tion if wrong had been done.

FRANCE.

A Manifesto.

PARIS, 20.—M. Louis Blanc,

member of the Assembly for the

Seine, has issued a manifesto ad-

vising the union of all republicans

in that body, instead of a coalition

of the centres, which he deems im-

possible.

PRUSSIA.

Assurance From Bismarck—

Treaty with Mexico.

BERLIN, 20.—Bismarck assures

the Turkish minister here that the

conclusion of direct treaty of com-

merce with Roumania will in no

wise prejudice the political sover-

eignty of Turkey. He said that

negotiations are now in progress

between the governments of Ger-

many and Mexico for the conclu-

sion of a treaty of commerce.
