[Wilhelm].—This celebrated violinist will give two performances at the Theatre next week. The engagement will open on Friday evening, the 9th inst., and conclude with a matinee on Saturday afternoon. Herr Wilhelm will be assisted by the charming prima donna, Marie Salvotti, and the noted Hungarian pianist, Max Vogrich. The usual Theatre prices will prevail, and the sale of seats will commence on Tuesday next. Mr. Henry Wolfson, manager of the Wilhelm concert, is now in our city completing arrangements for the appearance of this troupe. The following extract will give an idea of how this company is regarded elsewhere:

"It is not often the case that our musical community has the good fortune to hear such an artist as August Wilhelm. Since the past five years this artist has been identified throughout the whole civilized world, with the finest and grandest concert, and it has been generally conceded, that by virtue of his remarkable tone and superior technique, he must be considered the greatest violinist living. And the fact that almost unmountable difficulties, he overcomes playing, is sufficient to stamp Wilhelm as a great artist. The assistants secured by the management in these concerts are also worthy of the artist they accompany. Madame Salvotti the well known soprano of Glimore's concerts, has an established reputation, and Mr. Max Vogrich was remarkably successful last fall when he made his first appearance in New York."

The Concert Programme.—The programme for the Careless Orchestra Concert, on Monday night, which is now published, is, as we expected, unusually attractive. The orchestra open out with a grand overture from Mozart, which will be followed by the celebrated vocal quintette from the "Bohemian Girl." Mr. Croxall, the accomplished cornet player, will then execute a fantasia, the orchestra will perform a selection from "Masanillo." Miss Anderson will render a piano solo, and the "Turkish Review," by the orchestra, will close the first part of the programme. The overture to "William Tell" will introduce the second part, and be followed by the vocal duet "May Bells and the Flowers." The violin solo of the talented young artist, Mr. Willard Weihe, will then be given, and the orchestra will render "Fatinita," a selection by Meyer. Mrs. Joseph Siegel, the popular soprano, will sing the ballad "It was a Dream," and the performance of a waltz, "Tres Jolie," by the orchestra, and a spirited selection entitled "Peanuts," by the Croxall Brass Band, will complete the evening's entertainment. This is certainly a big bill, and should draw well, not only on account of being entirely of home talent, but for its real intrinsic excellence.

The Shooting at Salina.—Dr. Benedict has returned from Salina, Sevier County, whither he went last Tuesday, to attend young Rupert Taylor, who had been shot in the forehead. The patient was still alive at the time the doctor left, though the result of the affair could not be predicted with any assurance. The hall entered the brain and was allowed to remain there, the physician not deeming it advisable to extract it. The real cause of the shooting is unknown to anyone but the patient, who, despite of general incredulity, asserts that he did it on purpose. He had gone into his room at night. A shot was heard, but no attention paid to it, until his brothers, hearing a groan inside the room, entered and discovered Rupert on his hands and knees. In response to a question as to what was the matter, he said, "I am bleeding to death." He was attended to immediately. His position, notwithstanding the confession of the patient, was, that the shooting was accidental, and that having done it, young Taylor was restrained from telling the facts, by fear of an imputation of criminality.

A Sad Fate.—This morning's Junction says:

"One of those shocking accidents which are momentarily expected, and which are liable to happen at any instant to those engaged about ponderous machines, occurred on the Central Pacific, near Promontory, on Thursday, the victim this time being Mr. Joseph A. Kelly, a brakeman, residing in this city. No one witnessed the accident, but the indications are that while walking on top of the moving car, he slipped and missed his footing, and on falling to the track was frightfully mangled by the wheels of the car. The remains were brought to this city yesterday and interred. Deceased leaves a wife and three small children."

That Forgery.—John H. Hougan, the young man arrested a day or two ago on a charge of forgery and obtaining money under fraudulent pretenses, still languishes in jail. The examination, set for Friday, did not take place on account of the defendant's desiring more time to obtain witnesses. He maintains that the land in question, for which he gave a mortgage to Mr. Dahl for \$100, was his own property and not his father's. Why he signed his father's name, instead of his own, as is alleged, under such circumstances, does not yet appear. Mr. Hougan, the father, has been sent for, and the examination re-set for Monday.

The Men Who Were Not Hanged.—"I got famously taken in on that occasion," said the Duke. "The troops had taken to plundering a good deal. It was necessary to stop it, and I issued an order announcing that the first man taken in the act should be hanged upon the spot. One day, just as we were sitting down to dinner, three men were brought to the door of the tent by the provost. The case against them was clear, and I had nothing for it but to desire that they should be taken away and hanged in some place where they might be seen by the whole column on its march next day. I had a good many guests with me on that occasion, among the rest, I think, Lord Nugent. They seemed dreadfully shocked and could not eat their dinner. I did not like it much myself, but as I told them I had no time to indulge my feelings, I must do my duty. Well, the dinner went off rather gravely, and next morning, sure enough, three men in uniform were seen hanging from the branches of a tree close to the high road. It was a terrible example, and produced the desired effect; there was no more plundering; when, some months afterwards, I learned that one of my staff took counsel with Dr. Hume, and as three men had just died in hospital they hung them up and let the three culprits return to their regiments." "Weren't you very angry, Duke?" "Well, I suppose I was at first, but as I had no wish to take the poor fellows' lives, and only wanted the example, and as the example had the desired effect, my finger soon died out, and I confess to you that I am very glad now that the three lives were spared."—Life of Wellington-Weir.

An Insight into Canadian Politics.—The following story is told for a fact, and it will perhaps throw some light on the general results of the voting at the last Dominion election, and will also show the chance a woman went into a butcher's shop in a western town and asked for a sheep's head.
