The Ontario company of Park City has at last decided to build a large mill, and official announcement to that Rect his been made. Superintendent Rood states that the plant will be strictly modern and will probably be built something after the mills now in successful operation in the great camp. The point selected for the structure is near No. 3 shaft. As to the capacity, that is a point which has not been fully determined.

The plans will be completed early in the coming month when there will be no delay in getting to work on the con-struction, which will be under the di-rection of Alexander D. Moffatt, until recently superintendent of the Granite Mountain mill at Philipsburg, Monta-

na. Mr. Moffatt needs no introduction to the citizens of Park City for he was once before in the service of the On-tario company; filling the position of superintendent of the old Ontario mill which ground out a large portion of the dividends paid by the mine in the past, aggregating nearly \$14,000,000.
