STRONG MOVEMENT AGAINST GAMBLING

Gamblers Threaten to Make the Junction City a Second Monte Carlo.

UP TO OFFICERS TO REPRESS.

Prominent Citizens Want Ordinances and Statutes Enforced and Evil Kept in Check.

Ogden, Dec. 1.—The publication recently in the local newspapers that Ogden is to be made a second Monte Carlo, has caused no little talk among many of Ogden's best citizens. The report under big headlines that a certain well known gambler of Wyoming, who formerly operated in Salt Lake City, was coming to Ogden and open up a very large gambling house, running the games with a high hand, has caused many of the thinking people to wonder if our city is to be thrown wide open to the gambling element, and to be made a dumping ground for those gamblers who run their games so openly and boldly that they have to leave the cities where they have been operating and come to Ogden and open up. The city ordinances and statutes are very plain on this evil, and the officials of the city and county have the power to rid Ogden of this business. Salt Lake officials had to take stringent steps in ridding that city of at least a portion of the gamblers and why should they be permitted to come to Ogden and run their games, which Salt Lake and other cities won't have? MRS. DRAPER DEAD.

Falls Victim of Dropsy After Long Illness.

Ogden, Dec. 1.—Mrs. Anna F. Draper, wife of A. G. Draper, died at the Healy hotel shortly after 3 o'clock last evening from dropsy of the heart, from which she had suffered for the past three or four years. Mrs. Draper came to Ogden about five months ago from Minidoka, Idaho, to undergo treatment at the hands of Drs. Rich and Osgood. She recovered sufficiently to permit of her returning to Idaho, but was forced to return after a short absence. Mrs. Draper was 42 years old. She was born in Sweden, coming to the United States when 12 years of age. She had resided in Wyoming and South Dakota. She is survived by her husband, a 12-year-old daughter and three sisters. The remains will be interred in this city.

RAILROAD SITUATION.

Outlook More Encouraging—Sports and Festivities for Thanksgiving.

Special Correspondence. Logan, Cache Co., Nov. 30.—There is a great deal of discussion on the streets over the local railroad situation. The committee of the Commercial club who visited Salt Lake Saturday obtained from Mr. Bancroft a guarantee that the train between Logan and Ogden will not be run around the loop. As to the short cut to Cache Junction nothing definite was obtained. The prospects of a competing line into this valley

has finally caused an awakening on the part of the O. S. L. management, who now seem disposed to treat the people of Cache fairly both as to freight rates and train service.

There was a meeting Monday of the railroad committee, of the south end and of the Commercial club for the purpose of harmonizing their differences and with a view to uniting on some plan in which all can work together for the good of the valley. It is understood that since the south end cannot secure the through train service around the loop, it is willing to work with Logan for the cut-off to Cache Junction.
