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WASHINGTON FROTHER OUBROWED.

Chinese Woman Slain by a Coadjutor White Snake's Devoted Heart of Lincoln.

A rare specimen of the California condor was shot at Fresno, Cal., a few days ago and was brought to the museum. The bird measures nine feet from the tip of wing.

Jerry James has been selected chief of the Humboldt Indian tribe in California, and will go to Washington to see President McKinley and get him interested for government aid.

Strawberry growers of Hood River, Or., say that an immense crop is being raised and that people seeking work can find employment for the next month picking berries in Hood River valley.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 20.—Beatrice Bell, the well-known actress, came to San Francisco from Los Angeles and arrived at Palo Alto Tuesday night and is being entertained by a local committee and a group of friends.

At the railroad yards at Red Bluff, Cal., Wednesday, a brakeman named O. W. Kilduff was killed. A horse named the "brakeman" was thrown over his body, cutting him in two.

R. F. Howell, living in the mountains in the Sierra Nevada, was killed in his cabin Wednesday morning. An inquest will be held over the remains, which were brought here. Death is believed to have been due to natural causes.

The Moro, Or., Observer says that a pure white snake was killed recently on the Newton farm, near Minickton, in Sherman county, by Miss Alice Newton and J. H. Gregg. The snake was three feet long, and the Observer says it is the last of the kind ever killed in Oregon.

In New Whatcom, Wash., last week a cow caught little Bobby Kravitz, three years old, on her horns and tossed him up over her head. He fell on her back and slid off. Torn clothes and a few bruises were all the injuries sustained. The cow had a small cut with her ear and objected to the boy coming too close.

Albert Hanson, one of the pioneers of the state of Washington, was drowned in the western of the Strait Saturday. He was an expert canoeist and had safely put out of three crossings across the river. Returning with the other two in his canoe, which was overloaded, he was speared in a swirl. Hanson could have escaped easily by the stroke with a few feet of the shore, but he swam back to the canoe and soon sank. He was 60 years of age.

Tai He, a Chinese woman, was stabbed in her bed Wednesday morning at Portland, Oregon, by Mun Yin, a cook. A butcher-knife with a handle eight inches long was stuck in her throat at noon by Ah Row, the cook in the house, who had broken open her door. He had seen Mun Yin leave the place two hours earlier under suspicious circumstances and decided that something was wrong. A report was made to the police in the afternoon and detectives are at work on the case.

G. W. Louisa last week took to the Washington, Wash., office, a curious specimen. Nearly a month ago his son, Robert, living about seven miles northwest of Wainwright, noticed an animal in a field which attracted his attention, and he proceeded to slay it up. What he found was the skeleton of a living lion the size or look of some huge animal. It was about seven feet long, about eight inches in diameter, and tapered to a point about one inch in diameter with a socket in the butt end and curved like a horn. It is without joints.



She says Lincoln desired to pay her his address and obtained the consent of her father to propose marriage, but when the day came for the young rail-splitter to receive her final answer she avoided him by going away from home. Her conduct in thus slandering Lincoln, she says, made her father exceedingly angry.

No dyspeptics or consumptives need ask for positions in the Berkeley, Cal., school department. The board of education decided Tuesday night that instructors troubled with chronic indigestion were likely to be too brittle to fill their positions properly, and that those having pulmonary diseases were likely to spread such troubles among the students. A rule was adopted requiring all teachers to certify that they are free from such organic diseases. The new regulation goes into effect at once, and all of the present employees of the board are troubled with dyspepsia or with consumption they will find their heads in danger. The board will be appointing teachers for next year. The board will take the word of teachers or applicants for places that they are in good health, though some of the members desired to call for doctors' certificates.



A Wood Trough.
An inexpensive food trough for four or six sheep which they cannot stand is made of a piece of board 4 inches wide and 2 feet 6 inches long. That is nailed securely to two "logs," which are pieces of 2 by 2 scantling a foot long such as the bottom, and slanted off at about 7 or 8 inches to the end. These are set about 6 inches in from the ends. The end pieces are 7 inches high, 6 inches wide at base, and narrow to 3 1/2 inches at top, the sides being perpendicular for 1 1/2 inches and then tapering. The ends are nailed to the setting board, and the top strip of 2 1/2 inch



forming, is inserted between the ends and nailed, the top being to guard against the milk drinking out when the trough is filled by the sheep, which serves as a handle, though it is not used for the purpose. Good clear lath nailed along the sides and to the end pieces makes a sufficient side guard to the trough, projecting three-quarters of an inch to an inch above it, which is ample protection for the feet past them. When this trough is intended for outdoor use, a quarter inch hole is bored in each corner to allow the water to run off during a rain.



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
