on laws. A claim of the Ogden State bank, \$444 for interest advanced on refunding bonds, expressage, etc., was ordered for

committee on streets recom The mended that the petition of E. M. Con-roy and others to improve Twentyninth street between Grant and Lin-coln avenues, and also the petition of E. F. Bratz and others asking for a sidewalk on Thirtieth street, be grant-

. Both reports were adopted. The committee on police recommended the enforcement of the expectoration ordinance as per petition of the U. F. W. C. Aglaia and Child Culture The report was adopted.

The committee on water supply reported on the matter of appropriating the scepage water from the cemetery drain that Mr. John Shupe had laid claim to said water by appropriation, but that the city attorney held that he had no right, title, or interest in the water; referred to the law committee.

The poll tax collector filed his report for October, showing \$462. Dox Tax Collector J. A. Lampert re-ported \$155 collected. He desired that

It is reported that Sanpete county owns more sheep than any other county of the United States, and that Fountain Green owns sixty-five thousand of the number owned by the county-with all this wool in the hands of the sheepmen no woolen mill exists to manufacture
