MEETING OF CITY COUNCIL.

Weber County Business Transacted by Board of Commissioners.

Burglars Receive Sentence—Police Court Notes—Death of Mrs. Wm. T. Waymont—Licensed to Wed.

The city council met in regular session last evening and transacted considerable business.

The claim of Wm. C. Weaver, for hydrant rental which had been hanging fire since Sept. 24, being deferred from week to week, was referred to the finance committee.

The mayor called attention to subpoenas served on him, together with a copy of an amended bill of interest in the case of S. M. Jarvis vs. B. L. & R. I. and O. W. W. Co. Referred to the committee on laws.

Miscellaneous bills and pay rolls amounting to \$2,153.77 were ordered paid.

The claim of A. B. Canfield, \$112 back salary, was referred to the committee on laws.

A claim of the Ogden State bank, \$44 for interest advanced on refunding bonds, expressage, etc., was ordered paid.

The committee on streets recommended that the petition of E. M. Conroy and others to improve Twenty-ninth street between Grant and Lincoln avenues, and also the petition of E. P. Davis, and others, for a sidewalk on Thirtieth street, be granted.

The committee on police recommended the enforcement of the expropriation ordinance, and the petition of T. P. W. C. Agalala and Child Culture club. The report was adopted.

The committee on water supply reported on the matter of appropriating the sewage water from the city water drain that Mr. John Shupe had laid claim to said water by appropriation, but that the city attorney held that he had no right, title, or interest in the water, referred to the law committee.

The poll tax collector filed his report for October, showing \$442.

Dox Tax Collector J. A. Lampert reported \$155 collected. He desired that the council authorize him to shoot dogs where the tax remained delinquent. Referred to the tax committee.

The poundkeeper filed his monthly report showing thirteen animals impounded, all of which had been redeemed by their owners, and \$13 in fees deposited with the city treasurer.

City Sexton W. L. Porter filed his report for October, showing nineteen permits and \$113 collected for grave digging and sale of lots deposited with the city treasurer.

City Attorney R. B. Macmillan filed a report showing the manner of disbursing the warrant for \$235 appropriated to him to be expended in the water suit.

City Auditor L. E. Miller reported bond interest due in the sum of \$1,264.87, which was ordered paid.

Trile & Harnish asked for a rebate on their liquor license of \$75, they having closed their business. The petition was granted.

Mrs. Ada Wright and others asked for an electric light on the corner of Twenty-second and Adams. Referred to the committee on streets.

Edwin Peck and others asked for a change of location of the electric light on the corner of Twenty-eighth and Pacific avenues. Referred to the committee on streets.

F. B. Williams and others asked that some improvement on Jackson avenue between Twentieth and Twenty-first street be made. Referred to the committee on streets.

Emil Keller and others asked for special police on the bench. Referred to the committee on police.

The directors of the public library asked for a new radiator in the reading room. Referred to the committee on public buildings and grounds.

C. E. Mulligan and others asked for an electric light and a flagman at the railway crossing on Twenty-first street west of Wall where there are ten tracks continually being used for switching and for incoming and outgoing trains. Referred to the committee on streets.

C. J. Flowers and G. W. Barr, recommending, asked for the privilege of receiving their property from the city taxes by the payment of taxes and costs, the interest being remitted. Referred to the tax committee.

I. F. Farr and S. M. Fenstermaker offered to furnish the city with rock for the stockade at 65 cents per perch. Referred to the committee on streets.

City Engineer N. W. Bethel asked for \$215 back salary. Referred to committee on laws.

The Ogden City Waterworks company presented a bill of \$22.50, repairs and expenses caused by the city making an examination of the waterworks pipe to secure evidence to be used in the accounting before Master in Chancery S. H. Lewis, now in progress in Salt Lake City.

A. W. Brown introduced a notice of intention to create paving district No. 1, to pave, curb and gutter therein, and to defray the costs by the levy of special taxes. This district embraces three blocks on Washington avenue between 23rd and 26th streets. Referred to the committee on laws.

The size of bicycle racks permitted on the sidewalks was fixed at not over four and a half feet high and thirty inches wide.

A number of requisitions for supplies and material for the street, fire, sanitary and public grounds departments were authorized.

On motion \$100 was appropriated to the mayor's contingent fund.

A claim of C. K. Rannister for professional services in the waterworks case, \$250, was ordered paid.

One hundred dollars was appropriated to gravel Second street hill, which had been cut down and graded, after which the council adjourned.
