PRINCETON TO ENTER

**NEW LONDON REGATTA** 

Princeton university will participate in the intercollegiate rowing regatta at New London next June, says the New Haven Register. The rowing regatta at New London next June, says the New Haven Register. The rowing season has ended on Carnegie lake, but the whole program for next year has been mapped out, and this is what's going to happen:

Immediately after the beginning of the academic year Constance S. Titus who, it should be remembered, is coaching the Orange and Black as an amateur and not for pay, will issue a call for oarsmen. Princeton university within the last year has been greatly strengthened as to aquatic forces by the addition of about 25 scholars from St. Paul's school at Concord, N. H. At St. Paul's rowing is the only sport of any consequence. There is a big body of water there, and so numerous are the oarsmen that it is no uncommon thing to find a dozen eight-oared crews taking part in the school's regatta. St. Paul's is a "prep" school for Yale nad Harvard and Princeton.

The men from St. Paul's who have entered Princeton are great athletes, and know considerable about watermanship. It is expected that not fewer than 100 candidates will respond to Coach Titus' call. This will enable him to get several freshmen crews. They will work on the lake until late in the fall, when a regatta will be held. Following this they will be placed on the machines and after a long siege of gymnasium work they will be taken out to the open again the moment the ice breaks. Although Princeton is comparatively near New York, it is an odd fact that the ice gets off Carneeie lake fully two weeks before any other waters hereabouts. 


