**LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.**

**MEETINGS AT THE TABERNACLE.**—A service at eleven and two o'clock and in the various ward meetings in the evening.

**THEATRE.**—This evening will be presented the beautiful drama of "The Deal in the Snow," followed by the ballet, "Money for Me," by Mrs. Mathieson, song and dance by Mr. Mathieson, and the farce of the House-dog.

**N. M. MAXWELL.**—There are two letters for you at this office, addressed in care of the City Marshal of Salt Lake. Persons who may see this notice and who are acquainted with Mr. Maxwell, will please draw his attention to it.

**MORE CHICKEN STEALING.**—Various parties in the Ninth Ward complain that their chicken coops are being entered at night by stealing thieves who steal chickens therefrom. There were several cases of this kind in the last few nights. Look out for the snails, catch them, take them a lesson.

**THE SCANDINAVIAN MISSION.**—The statistical report of the Scandinavian mission for the year ending Nov. 30, 1911, gives the following figures:—Denmark, baptized 430, emigrated 230, total 2,200; Norway, baptized 125, emigrated 100, total 1,200; Sweden, baptized 450, emigrated 150, total 1,500. For the whole mission, baptized 1,005, emigrated 480, total 1,485.

**A MEER TOOL.**—From all that we can learn from unprejudiced sources, we incline to the opinion that a change of Federal officials in Utah would at present be a measure in the interest of justice and good government. We would also suggest to the Associated Press authorities that their agent at Salt Lake is a mere tool, and needs instructions. —Chicago Journal.

**IN TOWN.**—We had a pleasant call yesterday from J. B. McDonald and George S. Smith, Esq., who had just arrived from Chicago. The former represents the firm of Sweet, Dempster & Co., dealers in straw goods, gloves, umbrellas, etc., and the latter the house of Doggett Bassett & Hills, manufacturers and wholesale dealers in boots and shoes.

Both these firms are strictly reliable. Both houses were burned out by the great fire, but were in a few hours afterwards in temporary premises and carrying on business as usual. Sweet, Dempster & Co. are now at 50 & 51 W. Washington St. and Doggett Bassett & Hills at 200, Michigan Ave. Each firm is preparing to erect substantial buildings in which to carry on its large business in the near future.

Messrs. McDonald and Smith have both paid frequent business visits to this city, and are well known to the merchants and others here. They are stopping at the Townsend House and purpose remaining in town several days. The cards of both houses will be found in another column.

**DESERVING ITS FRIENDS.**—The Chicago Tribune, which has done more than any other single journal in the Union to encourage and uphold the lawless raids of the McKean mercenaries upon the people of Utah, is guilty of shamefully deserting its friends. Reviewing the disastrous condition of things existing in that Territory, it clamors for a radical remedy according to the following prescription:

"There should be some short, sharp, decisive way of settling these disgusting squabbles among small politicians. If Congress could order a general election in which those already in office could be forever removed from it, and those seeking to displace them could be forever disqualified from holding office, the suffering people would be forever grateful."

This is certainly rather drastic, and if Doctor Grant gives the Tribune dose to the Utah patient it will be likely to affect a speedy and radical cure. But it is to be noted that the Chicago Tribune means to overthrow the contract which it entered into to overthrow the Mormon power by means which were known to it to be as infamous as they have been lawless, and as they have been injurious to all interests. —Omaha Herald.

**DEAD AND GONE.**—The Territorial Enterprise learns from the Carson Register of the death of Judge John Cradabaugh, of congection of the lungs, at Eureka, Lander county, Nev., Feb. 19, aged about sixty. He was formerly a Federal judge in this Territory, and in that capacity manifested something of the fanaticism of McKean, and was a bitter enemy of the people of another character not unknown here.

The Enterprise says, after leaving Utah, Judge Cradabaugh was defeated to Congress from Nevada. In the late civil war he was colonel of an Ohio regiment, and was a place of his tongue was shot away, rendering him almost speechless, and, incapacitating him for further court labors. After the war he became an assistant general in Nevada. In 1895 he became a farmer on the Carson river, and in two years was killed by a bear. As a result, he sold his small estate, and turned freighter between Elko and White Pine, leaving one son, and a daughter, behind.

Afterwards he was a member of the law firm of Bryan & Cradabaugh at Portland, Oregon, which, however, broke up long ago, and he returned to Nevada. Judge Cradabaugh did not make much credit or capital out of his judicial raids on "Mormons," and his private life was as "Mormon" as his public life was "anti-Mormon." "Bullwhacker" is not a very encouraging record to judge of the McKean attitude.

**RETURNED MISSIONARIES.**—Elders John Hindley and William Greenwood, of American Fork, called on us this morning, having arrived yesterday from their mission. Elder Hindley is a native of Iowa and Mississippi, having been a member of the New Haven Baptist church, and the latter the latter place Bro. Cyrus C. Boley and other Saints would be pleased to have Elders, who may be passing them, call upon them. At St. Louis there are about 100 "Mormons" or relatives of "Mormons" of all kinds, from very good to good-for-nothing at all.

**HEAPS OF MAGAZINES.**—Mr. James Dwyer, of the News-Bullet, says that the blockade is broken, and a large stock of magazines, books, and papers of various kinds, have been shipped to the Territory.

**SCHOOL AS BARRICADE.**—We have been requested to draw attention to the fact that a person who poses an omnibus between the railroad depot and the central part of town frequently backs his vehicle up to the plank sidewalk at the depot, and just over the street crossing, giving pedestrians desirous to cross at that point the option of being run over by the omnibus, waiting till it is gone, or walking around it in the mud. This is a nuisance, and as such should at once be put a stop to.
