WEATHER ITEM.—The highest point reached by the thermometer to-day was 95.

THEATRE.—Owing to the notice of the performance of Marble Heart last night not being written until late this afternoon, and there being a press of other matter, it was unavoidably left over till to-morrow.

To-night the great play of Hamlet, with Mr. Adams in the title role, Mr. McCullough as the King and Miss Helen Tracy as Ophelia.

The Fairy Pantomime brought "down" the house several times during its presentation last night; its grandeur must be seen to be appreciated. It is the greatest triumph of Professor Redburn's skill and genius yet exhibited here; and is the most magnificent mechanical effect ever exhibited in this city. It will be repeated to-night.

WASATCH.—Elder Robert L. Campbell, just back from a trip to Wasatch, gives the following report of matters there. The prospect for crops is good; public improvement, especially in the erection of rock buildings, is going on rapidly; and education and co-operation are being well supported. Bishop Hatch is alive to the interests of his flock, is indefatigable in his labors for their good, and has the respect and good feelings of all.

PRESIDENT YOUNG AND COMPANY.—In a communication from "The Pioneer" we published the particulars of the journey of President Young and company up to the 2nd of June. On Saturday and Sunday the 1st and 2nd instants, two days' meetings were held at Paris; and on Sunday afternoon Brothers Woodruff and Sheets drove to Montpelier and held meetings there. On Monday, the 3rd, the company drove to Soda Springs, accompanied by Brother Charles C. Rich, and an escort of the brethren, the brass band from Paris, and a number of citizens with their families, who accompanied the party at the Springs. The aid of the brethren, the brass band, and the citizens, the party was well received. The weather is delightfully cool for the month of July, and those whose health was impaired when they were in the mountains are rapidly recovering. It is the intention to hold two days' meetings at Logan, Cache Valley, on the 22nd and 23rd inst. The company will probably arrive here by the evening of the 21st. We are indebted to President Wells for the above particulars, he having received them in a letter from President Young.

UTAH SOUTHERN R. R.—We are pleased to report the Utah Southern R. R. completed to Little Cottonwood, a distance of seven and a half miles. At this point the company is engaged in the construction of six hundred feet of pile and trestle work, at an elevation of twenty-four feet. Supt. Little is pushing the work vigorously ahead, and hopes to cross these obstacles by Tuesday the 18th inst., and reach Dry Creek at no distant day. At this last point he is now engaged driving piles and preparing to construct trestle work to the height of thirty-seven feet, in the neighborhood of Dry Creek there are two cuts to be made of eighteen feet each.

ARRIVED.—We were pleased to have a call from Elder Robert F. Nealen to-day, who returned last night, after an absence of over one year, having been during that time on a mission to England. During his stay in that country the principal part of his ministerial labors have been confined to London and vicinity, over which conference he presided. By instructions of Elder H. S. Eldredge, he also presided at several principal conferences in the mission. As a general thing he found large congregations who were willing to listen to him, and he was the recipient of the kindest treatment everywhere he went, making many warm friends among people not connected with the Church. He enjoyed his labors very much, although during the damp seasons his health was not good, which did not, however, prevent him from prosecuting his usual labors for more than nine days during the entire time of his mission. Judging by Brother Nealen's appearance, we believe his health is better now than it was at the time of his leaving here for England. He expresses himself as much pleased to be once more at home and at being able to greet old friends. The company with which Bro. Nealen journeyed from England to this city numbered 280 souls. They left Liverpool, on the 25th of S. S. W. When a short distance out from Queenstown they fell in with the brig Courier, bound from that port for America, which was in a sinking condition. The crew were taken on board the Wyoming and brought to New York. The passage of the latter city was a quiet one, although the weather was, for the season, unusually foggy and wet. The health of the company was generally very good, only one death occurring on the voyage, that of a child twelve days old. On arriving at New York the vessel was quarantined one day on account of there being one case of small-pox on board. The company was all vaccinated and then permitted to proceed. The vaccination, however, only took effect in two cases. The company, as far as New York, had been in charge of Elder George Lake, who left them at that point to visit his relatives in the States, when the Saints were placed under the care of Elder Naleen. Brother Nealen speaks very highly of the conduct of the railroad officials on the way from New York to this city, who, with a single exception, treated the company with the greatest consideration and courtesy. Brother Nealen informs us that his last voyage makes the seventh time he has crossed the Atlantic Ocean.

DELAYED ON THE WAY.—A letter from Elder R. F. Nealen, written at Omaha and dated the 5th inst., came to hand this morning. The communication gives an interesting account of the journey from England to that point, but we have probably had the pleasure of meeting Brother Nealen to-day, we prefer publishing the account as given from his own lips.
