Want Tax Terms to Sprinkle the Streets With.

NO SPECIAL TAX RETURN YET.

The Local Writy Rights on Retirees' Account.—Another Heavy Appropriation.

The regular session of the City Council was held last evening. As five minutes past eight, Councilman Martin was called to the floor. Bill and Evans were the only occupants absent.

A petition was read from T. A. Wickstrom asking the Council to purchase \$4,000 paving blocks at \$1.75 per square yard. F. O. B. Carr, at Salt Lake City, has been in the market of public works.

A petition, signed by Robert Clayburn and others, was read, asking the appointment of A. H. Davidson as special policeman without pay. Committee on police.

A claim for Cash Labor was presented asking \$20 for damage sustained by him from sewer running through his land and cutting off water connections for carp work. Committee on claims will report and suggest a verdict.

The Metropolitan pipe company which is the following recommendation was referred to the committee on Finance.

The undersigned Metropolitan pipe company is hereby respectfully petitioning you to authorize the city engineer to solicit bids for the purchase of the amount to be paid for pipe blocks to be used on the street.

A communication was received from the Paving Contractors' union asking for a franchise for a sewerage railway from the southeastern part of the city to the central part of the city.

A petition from George B. McClure et al, residents of Lincoln street, asking that money paid for extension of water mains on said street be refunded as said extension had not been made.

A petition was presented for the grading of Sixth North street between Fifth and Eighth West. The improvements not to exceed \$200.
