

## CONDITION NOT SO PRECARIOUS.

Hugh C. Watson, Victim of Stabbing Affray, Reported to be Much Better.

LIFE ALMOST DESPAIRED OF.

J. Harry Williams, His Assailant, Now in Custody—Statements of Principals.

The condition of Hugh C. Watson, the manster who was stabbed yesterday by J. Harry Williams, foreman of the Langston Lime & Cement Works, was much better this morning, according to the report received from his home, 424 west Fifth South street.

Williams, who was arrested by Detectives Raleigh and Shannon at 8:05 o'clock last night, is still in jail pending further developments, and no charge will be filed against him until it is determined whether or not Watson will win his battle for life. The wound inflicted is a serious one and Watson was in a precarious condition all last night.

Dr. J. S. Sharp says that the knife used by Williams penetrated the lungs, and a statement was made of the affair by Watson to the county attorney.

The statements of the two men differ as to which one started the row. Watson claims that Williams called him a villain and that he knocked him down and was thrashing him when Williams pulled a knife, opened it with his teeth and plunged the blade into Watson's breast.

Williams declares that Watson started the trouble by calling him names and then assaulted him. According to his story, Watson drove into the company's yards with a load of lime and Williams told him where to unload. He says Watson scattered the sacks about and when he spoke to him about it, Watson asked:

"What are you?"

"I am supposed to be the boss around here," Williams replied.

"You are a fine looking boss," Watson is alleged to have remarked, and then walked toward Williams. The latter says Watson knocked him down and was beating him. Williams says he called for help and then he drew the knife and plunged it into Watson's body. That ended the fight and Watson was taken home and a physician called.

Henry Dudley, an employee at the yards, says he saw Williams call for help. The story told by Watson is that Williams abused him until he could stand it no longer, and he proceeded to hit him. Watson is a large man, weighing probably 200 pounds or more. He is 23 years of age and unmarried.

Williams is about the same age, but weighs not more than 150 pounds. He has been married about a year, and has worked for the cement company for six months or more.

MYTON SAYS IT IS NOT SO.

Former Indian Agent Denies Story of The Uncomphages.

A dispatch yesterday stated that certain Uncomphage Indians had claimed that absolutely barren lands had been allotted to them, lands they had never before seen and knew nothing about until their attention was called to it.

Major H. P. Myton, formerly Indian Agent at White Rocks, says this is entirely untrue; and that a committee including James Jeffries, the pugilist, but the collector of customs at Memphis, E. R. Harper, clerk of the Colorado house of representatives and himself allotted the lands to the Indians, and only when the Indians themselves were on the ground. Cedar posts with descriptions of the locations and names of the assignees were set up at the location corners. The only exception was in a few cases of orphans for whom a guardian was appointed. DESCRIPTION OF THE ENGLISH SKYLARK

To the Editor:

The English skylark is not quite as large as our meadow lark, is of a sober brown color, lighter underneath the body, with dark brown spots on the breast, has a long slim beak, long feathers on the top of its head, which it raises or depresses at will, is very quick in its movements, is not a bird of plume, but lives on the seeds of grasses and weeds, etc. It is a very shy bird, and would have to be hard pressed with hunger before it would venture into a garden even in winter. It is to all intents and purposes a field bird, has extremely long toe nails, especially on the hind toe, and cannot balance on a perch in a cage or in a tree. These birds make their nests on the ground, having them pretty well concealed under a bunch of grass, generally, four brown eggs being about the average number laid. The male bird is a beautiful singer. It springs up from the ground and keeps rising gradually and warbling without intermission until it goes up completely out of sight. It stays up for ten minutes, when it gradually descends, but doesn't cease singing until it nearly reaches the ground. When a number of these birds are in the air singing at the same time the effect is charming, the very air seems to vibrate with their music. This bird must not be confounded with the wood-lark or tit-lark. The real English skylark is as harmless as our little snow birds.

## LIGHT FRANCHISE NOT CONSIDERED.

Matter Deferred Pending Inspection of Big Cottonwood Water Rights.

## NEWHOUSE PETITION GOES OVER

Dance Hall Ordinance Recommended For Passage With Certain Amendments.

The committee on municipal laws and the special water committee did not consider the petition of the Utah Light and Railway company for an extension of its franchise last night, as was intended, for the reason that the members of the council, with the mayor, city attorney, city engineer, Atty. F. S. Richards and former State Engineer Doremus, are on a trip of inspection up Big Cottonwood today to look at the water rights which the company proposes to exchange for the extension, and it was thought advisable to take no action until after the trip was made.

NEWHOUSE PETITION ALSO.

The Newhouse petition was not considered either, because a communication was received by Mayor Morris yesterday from Mr. Hanchett requesting that no action be taken until after the return of Mr. Newhouse, which will be in about two weeks.

DANCE HALL ORDINANCE.

The committee on municipal laws last night decided to recommend for passage, the dance hall ordinance, with the amendment that the license for each hall shall first be approved by the council instead of by the mayor.

MAY BE WILLIS BROWN.

Anti-Cigarette Campaigner Talked of For Judge of Juvenile Court.

When Salt Lake organizes her first juvenile court, it is possible that Willis Brown, who actively supported the bill providing for it in the Legislature, will be its first judge. A petition asking for his appointment has been signed by Rev. Peter Simpkin, Mathoniah Thomas, and O. L. Cox, secretary of the Y. M. C. A. The new law provides that the court shall be organized on or before June 1, next, and the selection of a judge is left to a commission composed of the chief of police, the superintendent of schools, and the mayor.

To make the law effective a judge with an aggressive interest in delinquent children is an essential, as the judge becomes more of an adviser and watchman than a sentencing official. The plan of the law is that a boy once brought before the judge is required to report at short intervals and give an accounting of his conduct, whatever its nature. Arrests are not made for crime but for any general waywardness that indicates a growing tendency towards grave offense. The court is intended to take hold of gangs of boys, putting them on probation during their good behavior and abstaining from petty deprecations.

It is known that a number of other candidates have announced themselves for the position, but the choice may not be made for several months yet owing to the preliminary work necessary to organizing the new court.
