If a horse is required to do more work than usual on a certain day or time. It is a common custom to give him re than the usual quantity of food.

Drivers are frequently instructed some-thing like this: "That team has a hard day's work before it: give them an ex-tra amount of grain." This is a great mistake, writes Dr. Galen Wilson in Practical Farmer, Owing to the fatigue consequent upon

the increased exertion, the animal is less able to digest a large feed, and therefore should be fed less rather than more. It is decidedly improper to give a horse a large feed just before under-going any severe strain, for the blood which is required by the digestive organs in order to carry on their proper functions, goes to the muscular system and digestion is impaired and colic the probable result. If a large feed i given immediately after active or pro-longed service, the animal is weak and the blood is drawn upon largely for the rebuilding of the muscular waste and the digestive organs suffer according able change of food y.
