## IN THE SECOND DISTRICT COURT.

### James Bottimer Being Tried for Assault to Commit Murder.

### CANNON-KIMBALL WEDDING.

### Death of Ella C. Rice—Funeral of Mrs. Ann Wesson—Briefs and Personal.

Ogden, April 7.—The trial of the case of the state against James Bottimer, charged with assault with intent to commit murder, came on for a hearing before Judge Howell and a jury yesterday afternoon, and was resumed again this morning. The defendant is charged with having on the day of July last shot Pat Smyth, an saloon keeper, with intent to kill him. Since that day Bottimer has been confined in the county jail awaiting trial.

P. T. Smyth was the first witness called. He testified that on the day of the assault he saw Bottimer enter his saloon without a word of warning, pull his pistol and fire, the bullet striking him in the chest. Two months previous to this he and Bottimer had a little difficulty, but he has not thought seriously about it, and did not expect the assault.

C. W. Round, Robert Barr, Elihu Ury and Frank Williams, who were in the saloon at the time of the occurrence, corroborated Smyth's testimony. Other witnesses were examined for the state, who completed their case late yesterday afternoon and the defense commenced to introduce testimony this morning. Mr. Chey, attorney for Mr. Bottimer, stated that his client intends to prove that the assault was made in self-defense.

The case of Mrs. L. G. McKinney, charged with forgery, was called. Judge Magnus stated that the defendant desired another judge to try the case.

Judge Howell said that he had considered Judge Maughan with regard to trying that case, and also the charge against Alfred Penrod, but the judge said that he could not give a definite answer until after April 18. Consequently the pleas of the defendants were not taken today.

Michael Berlin, a Greek, who attempted to extort \$40 from a fellow countryman named Nicholas Pepe, by threatening to lock him up in jail unless he paid the money, denied the charge. The date of his trial was not fixed.

Maud Malan, the woman who in July last threatened to shoot Mary Johnson, a neighbor, was called. She appeared for arraignment. She had no counsel, and the court appointed one for her to defend her. She entered a denial to the charge, and her case will be heard in September.

A license to wed was granted by the county clerk yesterday afternoon to Miss Kimball, 27, of Salt Lake City, and Miss O'Brien, 28, of Ogden City. The wedding ceremony will be performed Saturday night at the home of the bride-elect's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank J. Cannon, on Twenty-fifth street. Miss Cannon is the youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Cannon and one of Ogden's most popular young ladies. She has been an active worker in the Fifth ward of this city in various Latter-day Saints church capacities. Her bridegroom, Mr. Kimball, will reside, and her excellent work will be missed by the ward authorities. Miss Cannon is popular in social circles.

Mr. Kimball is a prominent young man of Salt Lake City, and is connected prominently with the Annie Laurie mine at Kimberly, Utah.

### STOLEN HORSE AND BUGGY RECOVERED.

The horse and buggy stolen Monday night from Mr. Snow of Brigham City was recovered yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Benlap at West Weber. The outfit, together with Mr. Snow's coat, gloves, rubbers and two quilts, were taken from in front of a house where Mr. Snow was calling. No trace of it could be had until the sheriff's office here learned that a horse and buggy had been found by F. H. Wright of West Weber Tuesday morning. Then they tied the lines over the dash board and turned the horse loose, hoping it would return home, but instead it wandered around until taken in charge by Mr. Wright.

### DEATH CLAIMS ELLA C. RICE.

Miss Ella C. Rice, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. E. G. Rice, died yesterday at the home of her parents at Layton, Davis county, of dropsy, aged 15 years, one month and 17 days. The time and place of funeral has not been decided upon.

To Extend Water System and Pay Floating Indebtedness.

Brigham City, Boxelder Co., April 5.—At a mass meeting held in the Opera House Monday evening, the mayor and city council were authorized to call an election for the purpose of voting on the proposition of issuing bonds in the sum of \$60,000, to be used in extending the city water system, and in paying the floating indebtedness of the electric light plant.

It was unanimously voted to grant the Independent Telephone company a franchise to install its telephone system in our town.

### DEMISE OF BRIGHAM TELFORD.

Highly Respected Young Man Laid to Rest After Impressive Service.

Lewiston, Cache Co., April 3.—Brigham H. Telford died at his home in Lewiston on Saturday, April 1, of pneumonia, which he contracted while on duty at the Idaho State Penitentiary. He was 23 years of age. The speakers were Elders John Kemp, John M. Andersen, President Brigham A. Hendricks, Morris J. Stoenaker, Joseph E. Goudy, A. H. Jones, John M. Bernhisel, Jr., President of the H. Lewis, James M. Andersen and Bishop William Waddams. All made consoling remarks and many tributes were paid to the departed one, who was a faithful worker in the 117th quorum of Seventy, as a member of the Benson stake Sunday school union board and instructor in the Y. M. M. I. A. He died as he had lived, a faithful Latter-day Saint. The attendance at the funeral was not large on account of smallpox, there now being seven or eight homes under quarantine. The weather is clear, with a cold wind blowing. Everybody is busy preparing for spring planting.
