SENATE.

Report of the Moieties Bill, &c.

WASHINGTON, 18.—Scott called up

the report of the conference com-

mittee on the moiety bill, and a

motion was made to bring the

salaries of the collectors of New

York, Boston, Philadelphia, San

Francisco and New Orleans.

Howe, argued against the aboli-

tion of the moiety system, and said

it made the revenue laws less ef-

fective than ever, as the penalties

would never be enforced, for two

reasons. First, they were so loose

they could not be; second, because

the officer undertaking to enforce

them would be called infamous by

act of Congress. He also complai-

ned of fixing the salary of the col-

lector of New York at twelve thou-

sand dollars.

Conkling defended this provision

of the bill on the ground of the

heavy responsibility of the col-

lector.

Carpenter declared the bill

was in favor of smugglers. He re-

plied to the criticisms of the New

York press on his manner of form-

ing a conference committee.

The chair then called up the un-

finished business, being the bill to

pay the awards of the Southern

Claims Commission.
