COLORADO FIRES DOING GREAT DAMAGE.

**Funds May Suffer from Short-Interest
Against the Senator-Aged Counterfeiter
Appeared The France Market.**

Two freight trains uniting in a head-
on collision at Rockwood, Wyo., 20 miles west of Casper, killed 12 persons.

Two freight train cars were derailed and mangled at Grace, a small station on the Elmer Line east of Rock Springs Tuesday night. The injured are Constance Herne and Hyacinth Green, and Pleasant Kellum is said to be recovering. The work will delay traffic for an indefinite time.

The *Bertha* is scheduled to arrive today, and it is expected to bring word of the fate of the other ships en route. The *Winnipeg* went from St. Michael to Normand Bay, and *Kentucky*

The steamer *Douglas* arrived at Victoria, B. C., Tuesday from St. Michael's, Alaska, with 285 passengers from the Klondike, and gold just over \$100,000. The miners were unanimous in their opinion that the gold was divided among the miners except dividends, if all belonged to a favored few.
