### MUNICIPALITY AFFAIRS.

Business Transacted by the City Council Monday Night.

Webster County Business by the Board of Commissioners—Wedding Bells—District Court Notes—Reunion.

The city council met last evening and transacted the following business:

The matters of the W. C. Weaver bill for rental of hydrants used for sprinkling, the bids for the purchase of 1,000 feet of hose, and the protests in the proposed sewer district No. 9, were discussed and finally laid over until another meeting.

Miscellaneous claims and pay rolls amounting to \$1,375.14 were ordered paid.

The sanitary committee recommended the thorough cleaning of the city in order to provide against the spread of smallpox and also recommended the purchase of sufficient vaccine virus to vaccinate all people unable to pay for the same and that due notice be given that sanitary ordinances must and will be enforced. The report was adopted.

The committee on public buildings and grounds recommended the painting of Lester Park pavilion at a cost of \$60, but the report was rejected.

A new cartridge, claimed by an Italian inventor, is said to be an effective substitute for dynamite and smokeless powder for mines and heavy ordnance.

It contains a mixture of carbonate of potassium and other salts, and is said to be a very effective explosive.

A new method of treating tuberculosis by electricity has been brought forward. The method consisted in placing a patient under a high voltage current through the body for 20 or 30 minutes.

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# THE GREATEST OF CHINESE REFORMERS.

The greatest military genius that China ever produced, says a recent official of the Chinese imperial service in Frank Leslie's Popular Monthly for October, has remained without honor in his own country on account of his radical spirit.

This was the Prince of Tsin, who destroyed the feudal system and founded the modern empire. As a soldier and statesman, he was a man of great power and a ruthless persecutor. But any other nation than the Chinese would have defied him after death. Only his records show that he described his life as a battle of Campdown, Oct. 11, 1776.

It was noticed more than 200 miles away, at Sebastopol, in 1854, at the battle of the Tientsin, about 125 miles, and at the sinking of the Alabama nine miles off Cherbourg, June 19, 1864, about 125 miles.
