The Standard thinks that the fact that the end of February had been fixed upon for the attack on Coomassie indicates that the condition of the British torops is not hopeless, but at the same time sees, that, under the circumstances, au-dacity gives the only chance, not merely for victory, but for saving

the army. The Daily Telegraph's special dispatches say the Highlanders suffered a heavy loss in consequence of the enemy being in ambush, the ground being hilly and the ambush dense. General Wolseley was within fifteen miles of Coomassie. All the London journals show, in their editorials on the Ashantee news, the utmost anxiety as to the result. The Times and Telegraph attribute the failure of the peace negotiations to the uncompromising determination of the British commander to enter Coomassie, an event which the king was willing to do anything to prevent.

The British at Coomassie. The following dispatch was re-ceived to-day, at the War office, and was published by the newspapers in extras at noon:

"Coomassie "We reached here yesterday, after five days' hard fighting. The troops behaved admirably. Our casualties are under three hundred. The king is in the neighborhood of the town. He promises to visit me to-day, and sign a treaty of peace. We hope to start on our return to the coast to-morrow. The wounded are recovering, and the health of the remainder of the army is good. (Signed) "WOLSELEY."
