

NAPOLEON, As Seen by His Associates

HOW NAPOLEON LOOKED

II.

APOLÉON's secretaries handed down in their memoirs glimpses of Napoleon as they saw him on different occasions. One of them had shared Napoleon's school life at the military college of Brienne. This was Bourrienne, who served the first consul as private secretary up to 1802. According to Bourrienne, Napoleon's appearance was noteworthy in boyhood. He says:

"When at Brienne, Bonaparte was remarkable for the dark color of his complexion. Oftentimes subsequently the climate of France somewhat changed, for his piercing and scrutinizing glance and for the style of his conversation."

Writing of Napoleon about the time he assumed the reins of power as first consul, Bourrienne says:

"Bonaparte was now in the prime of life and about 30. The person of Bonaparte had changed as a result of the many skillful painters and sculptors, many able French artists who successfully delineated his features, and yet it may be said that no perfect-

particularly because he thought a good deal of them.

"He has an habitual slight stoop. His eyes are dull, giving to his face when in repose a melancholy and meditative expression. When he is excited with anger his looks are fierce and menacing. Laughter becomes him. It makes him look more youthful and less forbidding. It is difficult not to like him when he laughs, his countenance improves so much. He was always simple in his dress.

"I have said there was a sort of fascination in the smile of Bonaparte, but during all the time I was in the habit of seeing him he rarely put forth that charm. Gravity was the foundation of his character—not the great and dignified, and noble manner, but that which arises from profound thought.

In his youth he was a dreamer, later in life he became a moody and later still an habitually ill tempered man."

Being in the suit of the emperor at the coronation of Napoleon and Josephine in 1804, Mme. de Remusat was close to the emperor and gives a graphic picture of his costume and presence: "His own costume was brilliant. He

Is faithful portrait of his exists. His round shaped head, his superb forehead, his pale countenance and his usual meditative look have been transferred to the canvas, but the versatility of his expression was beyond the reach of imitation. All the various workings of his mind were instantaneously depicted in his countenance, and his glance changed from mild to severe and from angry to good humored almost with the rapidity of lightning. It may truly be said that he had a particular look for every thought that arose in his mind.

Bonaparte had beautiful hands, and he was proud of them. While conversing he would often look at them with an air of self complacency. He also fancied he had fine teeth, but his pretension to that advantage was not so well founded as his vanity on the score of his hands.

Chateaubriand, the author and statesman, and Kotzebue, the dramatist, describe Napoleon as he appeared about the time of the coronation in 1804.

"I was in the gallery," says Chateaubriand, "when Napoleon entered. I was agreeably struck by him. I had never seen him before except at a distance. His smile was kindly and delicate. His eyes were admirable, especially from the moment in which they were set under his brow and framed by the eyelashes. There was no pretense in his look, nothing either theatrical or affected."

Chateaubriand had abandoned Napoleon's cause before he wrote this impression and was not a partisan.

"I have never seen a portrait of Bonaparte either in Germany or France," says Kotzebue, "that really described him. The great number, indeed, are not. He is not at all. The effigy of the first France pleases me. In November 1804, I painted him. Each time that I have seen him since, I have been struck by his resemblance to Bonaparte himself. His profile is Roman—that is to say, grave, noble, and expressive. When he is silent he looks cold and even severe, but as soon as he speaks a truly gracious smile renders his mouth very pleasant and inspires confidence immediately."

All witnesses note the mobility of Napoleon's features. He always looked the part he happened to be playing.
