

NAPOLEON, As Seen by His Associates

HOW NAPOLEON LOOKED

II.
NAPOLEON'S secretaries handed down in their memoirs glimpses of Napoleon as they saw him on different occasions. One of them had shared Napoleon's school life at the military college of Brienne. This was Bourienne, who served the first consul as private secretary up to 1802. According to Bourienne, Napoleon's appearance was noteworthy in boyhood. He says:
"When at Brienne, Bonaparte was remarkable for the dark color of his complexion (which subsequently the climate of France somewhat changed), for his piercing and scrutinizing glance and for the style of his conversation."
Writing of the ruins of power as first consul, Bourienne says:
"Bonaparte was now in the prime of life and about 30. The person of Bonaparte has served as a model for the most skillful painters and sculptors, many able French artists have successfully delineated his features, and yet it may be said that no perfect-

particularly because he thought a good deal of them.
"He has an habitual slight frown. His eyes are dull, giving to his face when in repose a melancholy and meditative expression. When he is excited with anger his looks are fierce and menacing. Laughter becomes him. It makes him look more youthful and less formidable. It is difficult not to like him when he laughs, his countenance improves so much. He was always simple in his dress.
"I have said there was a sort of fascination in the smile of Bonaparte, but during all the time I was in the habit of seeing him he rarely put forth that charm. Gravity was the foundation of his character—not the gravity of dignified and noble manner, but that which arises from profound thought. In his youth he was a dreamer, later in life he became a moody and later still an habitually ill-tempered man."
Being in the suit of the empress at the coronation of Napoleon and Josephine in 1804, Mme. de Remusat was close to the emperor and gives a graphic picture of his costume and presence.
"His own costume was brilliant. He

ly faithful portrait of his exists. His finely shaped head, his superb forehead, his pale countenance, and his usual meditative look have been transferred to the canvas, but the versatility of his expression was beyond the reach of imitation. All the various workings of his mind were instantaneously depicted in his countenance, and his glance changed from mild to severe and from angry to good humored almost with the rapidity of lightning. It may truly be said that he had a particular look for every thought that arose in his mind.
"Bonaparte had beautiful hands, and he was proud of them. While conversing he would often look at them with an air of self-congratulation. He also fancied he had fine teeth, but his pretension to that advantage was not so well founded as his vanity on the score of his hands.
"When walking, either alone or in company with any one, in his apartments or in his gardens, he had the habit of stooping a little and crossing his hands behind his back. He frequently gave an involuntary shrug of his right shoulder, which was accompanied by a movement of his mouth from left to right. This habit was always most remarkable when his mind was absorbed in any deep subject.
"He used often to say to me: 'You see, Bourienne, how temperate and how thin I am, but in spite of that I cannot help thinking that at 40 I shall become a great eater and get very fat. I foresee that my constitution will undergo a change. I take a great deal of exercise, but yet I feel assured that my presentiment will be fulfilled.'
A vein of criticism, more or less centes of Mme. de Remusat, a close friend and companion of Josephine and her champion in the rupture with Napoleon. The following descriptions of Napoleon's person and of his appearance on state occasions are taken from her memoirs, translated by Mrs. Cashe Hoey and Mr. John Lillier.
"Napoleon Bonaparte is of low stature and rather ill proportioned. His bust is too long and so shortens the rest of his figure. He has thin chestnut hair, his eyes are grayish blue, and his skin, which was yellow while he was slight, became in later years a dead white without any color. His forehead, the setting of his eyes, the line of his nose—all that is beautiful and reminds one of an antique medallion. His mouth, which is thin, tipped, became agreeable when he laughs. The teeth are regular. His chin is short, and his jaw heavy and square. He has well formed hands and feet. I mention them

was to assume the imperial robes at Notre Dame, but for the present he wore a French coat of red velvet embroidered in gold, a white sash, a short cloak sewed with bees, a plumed hat turned up in front with a diamond buckle and the collar of the Legion of Honor in diamonds. This superb dress became him well.
"On his arrival at Notre Dame the emperor entered the archiepiscopal palace and there assumed his robes of state. They seemed almost to crush him. His slight frame collapsed under the enormous mantle of ermine. A simple laurel wreath encircled his head. He looked like an antique medallion, but he was extremely pale and genuinely affected. The expression of his countenance was stern and somewhat distressed.
Chateaubriand, the author and statesman, and Kotzebue, the dramatist, describe Napoleon as he appeared about the time of the coronation in 1804.
"I was in the gallery," says Chateaubriand, "when Napoleon entered. I was agreeably struck by him. I had never seen him before except at a distance. His smile was kindly and delicate. His eyes were admirable, especially from the manner in which they were set under his brow and framed by the eyelashes. There was no pretense in his look, nothing either theatrical or affected.
Chateaubriand had abandoned Napoleon's cause before he wrote this impression and was not a partisan.
"I have never seen a portrait of Bonaparte, either in Germany or France," says Kotzebue, "that really resembled him. The great number, indeed are not like him at all. The effigy on the five franc piece struck in the year 12 is faithful. Each time that I see it I think of Bonaparte himself. His profile is Roman—that is to say, grave, noble and expressive. When he is silent he looks cold and even severe, but as soon as he speaks a truly gracious smile, and his mouth very pleasant and inspires confidence immediately.
All witnesses note the mobility of Napoleon's features. He always looked the part he happened to be playing.
