## PROBABLE ATTEMPT AT SUICIDE.

Joseph Schmidt, a Young Russian Jew, Shoots Himself and Is Seriously Injured.

## GLASMANN WILL RETRACT.

Charges Against Sken Pronounced Untrue—Demurrer in Sken-Chambers Case.

Ogden, Feb. 2.—A young Russian Jew, who gives his name as Joseph Schmidt, shot himself yesterday afternoon with a .38 caliber revolver. He claims the shot was fired accidentally, but the wound inflicted just below the left nipple and his shirt is badly powder burned. He had opened his coat and vest and must have held the gun close to his body, which would indicate he had intended ending his life. To a representative of the "News" he stated that he arrived in Ogden a few days ago from San Francisco, and stopped over here for a short time to receive some money that was to be sent him. He was staying at the Windsor hotel. Yesterday morning he decided to go up into the mountains with him his pistol and a bottle of whisky. He had climbed the mountain side near the mouth of Taylor's canyon almost to the top over very rough rocky ledges, getting up the point where the accident happened about 2 o'clock in the afternoon. He says he was handling the pistol when it accidentally discharged, the bullet entering his side. Realizing that he was badly hurt he called for help and was fortunately for him Peter G. Poulsen and A. C. Alsop happened to be a short distance below the foot of the mountain side and heard his cries. They rushed to a house about a mile distant and secured a shot gun and instructed the lady that if they found the man and needed help, they would fire three shots and then the lady should notify the officers, which was done and Deputy Sheriff Wilson and Shaw, Sergeant Chambers, Officers Layne and Robert Burke, together with representatives of the Standard Journal and News, drove to the foot of the mountains nearly five miles away, and then they all climbed the mountain side for fully a quarter of a mile to where the man lay conscious but suffering great pain. He was placed on a quilt and carried to the patrol wagon in which he was laid and taken to the police station. City Physician Condon was summoned and after injecting morphine and making a careful examination of the wound, ordered the man taken to the Ogden general hospital where he was carefully examined and the wound probed. The bullet missed entirely through his body coming out near the spinal column a few inches lower than where it went in, missing his lungs and other vital organs. The bullet was found by the nurse at the hospital in his clothing. It was quite badly battered showing that it had struck a bone. Should no serious complications set in he will recover from the wound in a few weeks. Schmidt states that he is 27 years

**WIFE CHARGES CRUELTY.**  
A divorce suit has been filed in the Second district court by Eliza Ann Peterson against Joseph Peterson. The complaint alleges that the couple were married at Ogden April 5, 1905. The wife charges that on July 24, her husband slapped her face, pulled her ears and knocked her down; that on Dec. 19 he threatened to gouge her eyes out and attempted to do so, that on Feb. 6, 1906, he threatened to kill her, and has in many other ways been cruel to her. The court signed an order requiring defendant to pay \$50 into the court for cost to prosecute the action.

**J. D. SKEEN EXONERATED.**  
Charges of Irregularity in Fair Association Finances Not True.  
Ogden, Feb. 7.—At a special meeting of the Weber county fair association held last evening at the office of its president William Glasman, the accusations against former secretary of the company, J. D. Sken, as published in the Ogden Standard and Morning Examiner, were investigated by members of the present board of directors, and according to a resolution adopted at the meeting the said articles were unjust and misrepresented the facts, also that there were no irregularities in the manner of their handling, except in the manner of their handling, which will be changed. In the past all money received by the treasurer was kept by him in a private account, and all expenditures were made on the order of the treasurer and president without the secretary's knowledge of what was being done.

The articles referred to were read by Mr. Sken before the meeting and the discussion which followed was a heated one. As a result of the controversy Mr. Glasman agreed to publish a retraction.  
**TAKEN UNDER ADVISEMENT.**  
Demurrer of Fred W. Chambers Argued in District Court.  
Ogden, Feb. 7.—The greater part of yesterday was occupied in the Second district court before Judge Howell in the hearing of arguments on a demurrer filed by Fred W. Chambers in the action brought by Attorney J. D. Sken, charging him with misappropriation of funds of Ogden City, while serving as city councilman and president of the city council. Corn and MacMillan represented the defendant in the arguments, while Attorneys J. W. Kimball and George Halverson represented the accuser. The defendant's attorneys argued that the demurrer to the accusation should be sustained on the grounds that the complaint is indefinite and that while only one cause of action is set up in the same, there are two distinct charges made, and that an action for removal from office against a city councilman cannot be brought in the way that Mr. Sken has brought the suit against Councilman Chambers. The attorneys for the plaintiff argued that the suit was brought in the proper way and that the complaint is proper. Many authorities were read by the respective

**FRANKLIN STATUE FOR PARIS.**  
New York, Feb. 7.—A bronze statue of Benjamin Franklin, which John Harlan, a member of the Parisian branch of the banking house of J. P. Morgan, is to give to the municipality of Paris, was completed yesterday at Green Point. It is a replica of the statue in front of the Philadelphia post office and cost \$10,000. Its weight is 7,000 pounds, and it represents Franklin in a sitting position.  
The statue is eight feet high and rests on a bronze base. It will be shipped to France by the express, and will be placed in the Rue Franklin where the United States embassy was located when Franklin was United States ambassador to France. The statue will be unveiled in April.

**SCIENTIFIC MISCELLANY.**  
The telenobioscope, designed by a Dusseldorf inventor for enabling a pilot to detect a ship near at hand in a fog, depends upon the fact that electric waves are reflected when they strike a metallic object. The apparatus consists of a long box or tube, pivoted at one end and open at the other, containing a spark generator near the pivoted end and two lenses for collecting the reflected waves into a bundle. A suitable motor turns the box horizontally on the vertical pivot. As the box slightly inclined toward the water, is swung around, the electric waves are projected outward, and if they strike an object containing metal, they are reflected back, acting upon a receiver similar to that used in wireless telegraphy. This receiver is influenced only by return waves. When a vessel is discovered, the apparatus is turned until the reflection is strongest, when a good estimate of the distance can be made.

One's hair, if never cut, would furnish a record of his health during life. This is the interesting discovery of Matsuro, a Japanese physiologist, who shows that the hair-like the finger nails—grows smaller in disease, and that the duration of the malady may be estimated from the length of the thinner sections of the hairs. The variations are most striking in the coarse-haired races of people.

If odors were solid particles, they would tend to form nuclei of cloudy condensation in supersaturated air. Dr. John Aitken has tested musk and twenty-three other odorous substances without finding such nuclei, and he concludes that odors are gaseous and that smell has gas as its fundamental basis.

In using incandescent mantles for lighting the illumination is found to increase for a time, then it steadily diminishes. The rise at first is thought to be due to a gradual shaping to the flame, and the subsequent gradual fallure is attributed to two causes. Dust particles of silica drawn against the mantle by the air currents form infusible silicates of small illuminating power. The more important cause of de-lamination, however, is the slow volatilization of the ceria, to which the incandescence is due. The amount of moisture in the air has a slight effect on the light of a mantle.

Luminous electric radiators are claimed by H. J. Dowling, the British electrician, to offer important advantages. They can be taken from room to room where needed, and they can be placed in the most effective positions, the rays can be applied to heating the lower part of the room or the part where heat is needed, the heat can be turned on and off at will. Consequently, there is no combustion, and no special ventilation is required. For cold days or cold parts of a room they are especially economical. The ready efficiency goes far to offset the loss in converting energy into electric current and then into heat, and makes electricity a competitor with gas for heating.

The production of coal ornaments is one of Japan's interesting industries. The hardest and best pieces of coal are carefully saved by the miners, and these are cut into a great variety of shapes, and mounted in rings, trinkets and chains, or used for the heads of canes and umbrellas, or for other novelties. A chain lately sold is of solid black coal, each link being perfectly cut.

A novel electric station-indicator, the invention of a Danish engineer, is in use upon a Berlin tramway. The apparatus is contained in a glass-faced wooden case, and shows the name of the next station in a conspicuous place

## GRAZING ON THE UTAH RESERVE.

Forest Supervisor D. S. Marshall Publishes Regulations Governing Permits.

## SUMMER AND ANNUAL PERMITS

Sheep to the Number of 450,000 and 35,000 Head of Cattle and Horses Will be Admitted.

Forest Ranger D. S. Marshall publishes the following regulations governing the Utah forest reserve for the year 1906. Kamas, Utah, Feb. 4, 1906.—Provisions have been made for the grazing of 50,000 head of cattle and horses, and 60,000 head of sheep in the Utah forest reserve during the season of 1906. Each two lambs six months old will be counted, and paid for, as equal to one grown sheep.

The reserve is divided into 20 districts, the old reserve and the Wyoming addition are covered by districts 1 to 11, inclusive, old districts 12 to 19 have been consolidated and will now be known as districts 1 and 2 of the present district No. 12. The remainder of the reserve is covered by districts 12 to 20 inclusive. The map also shows the areas set aside as cattle ranges, from which sheep are excluded, the sheep driveways established, and the areas for lambing.

There will be 25,000 head of cattle and horses, distributed among districts 1 and 11 inclusive, and 10,000 head among districts 12 to 20 inclusive.  
The sheep will be distributed as nearly as possible as follows:

District No. 1 ..... 16,000  
District No. 2 ..... 20,000  
District No. 3 ..... 20,000  
District No. 4 ..... 20,000  
District No. 5 ..... 20,000  
District No. 6 ..... 20,000  
District No. 7 ..... 20,000  
District No. 8 ..... 20,000  
District No. 9 ..... 20,000  
District No. 10 ..... 20,000  
District No. 11 ..... 20,000  
District No. 12 to 16 ..... 20,000  
District No. 17 ..... 20,000  
District No. 18 ..... 20,000  
District No. 19 and 20 ..... 20,000  
Total ..... 170,000

The grazing season for cattle and horses will be from May 1 to Oct. 30, the charged fee for each head of stock will be \$1.00 per head, provided that class "A" stock may be allowed in the reserve the full grazing year, May 1, 1906, to April 30, 1907, the charge for which will be 40 cents per head. Stock entitled to the year-long season, and for which yearly permits are issued, may remain in the reserve until May 1, free of charge.

The one-half rate limit number is 20 head of stock to one permit. This means that a person who is given a permit covering 20 head of cattle, or less, and a number of horses, may pay one-half rate on the 20 cattle covered by the permit and a full rate on the horses, and a person who permits more than 20 cattle will pay one-half rate on 20 cattle and a full rate on all stock cattle and horses over that number.

The regular summer grazing season for sheep will be from July 1 to Oct. 30, the charge for which will be 40 cents per head, provided that 20,000 breeding ewes may enter districts 12 and 18 on May the 1st, for lambing purposes, the extra fee for which will be 2 cents per head. The percentage basis of increase to be used in approving applications in advance the number of lambs to be counted will be computed. All applications for grazing permits must be presented to D. S. Marshall before March 10, 1906.

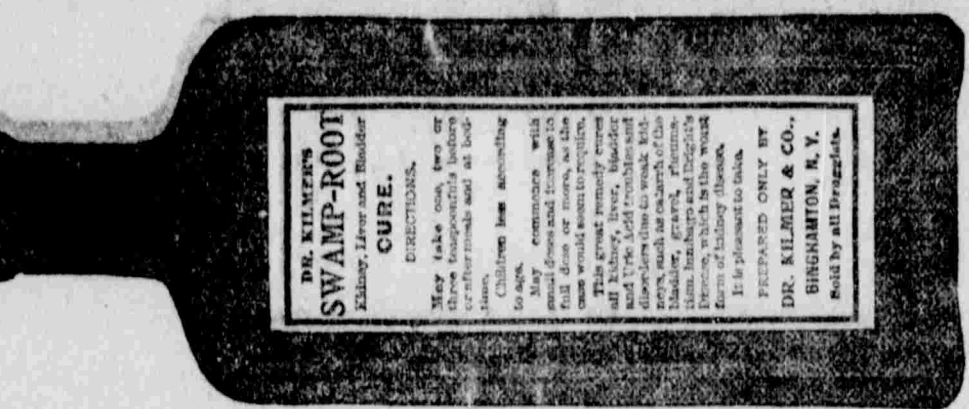
