In a few weeks every trace of dandruff had disappeared, the hair became soft and glossy, and now, after a discontinuance of the treatment for several months, there is no indication of the return of the disease. Il do not pretend to explain the modus operandi of the treatment, for it is well known that sublimated sulphur is almost or wholly insoluble, and the liquid used was destitute of taste, smell or color. 
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
