Boecher's Protest Against Letter Writers.

The more cowardly enemies and opponents of Henry Ward Beecher having annoyed him with scurrilous and offensive postal cards to a degree beyond which endurance was no longer a virtue, the famous pastor of Plymouth Church filed a protest with the Postmaster General of the United States against these indignities. The protest was referred to General J. W. Marshall, First Assistant Postmaster General, who gave the matter his immediate attention, laying the facts before Judge Spencer, U. S. Assistant Attorney General, for the Post-office, and soon after effected the following opinion:

"In compliance with your request to be advised as to the propriety of excluding from the mails, under the provisions of the 5,884 section of the Revised Statutes, a postal card addressed to Brother Henry Ward Beecher, of Brothers Sherman, Tracy & Co's Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, and on the ground of which was written, 'Thou shalt not bear false witness against thy neighbor.'"

The City of Churches once stood here. But God and moral law it did not fear. Its idol was Beecher, its ruler a ring. That virtue and vice together did sing; it nourished apace and greedily did grow. Then down in the dust descended full low—
Gene to John Sodom and Gomorrah.

"I will reply that the purpose of the law referred to is obvious, but cannot be reached by a strict construction of its terms. Therefore such a construction should be given to its terms as will attain the object intended. The object was to protect the abuse of the mails by giving publicity to offensive expressions and allegations calculated and intended to wound the feelings of the person to whom the mailable matter is addressed, or prejudice him in his business, moral or social standing. Such, I consider to be the character of the writing and of the printed scrap attached to the postal card submitted to me, and that its exclusion from the mails for that cause would be proper."

The question in turn arises, How is the Brooklyn postmaster to know if the cards are scurrilous, unless he reads them, and how can he read them without disobeying a previous ruling of the Post-office Department, that post-office officials must not acquaint themselves with the contents of a postal card any more than with the contents of a sealed letter?—Washington Letter in N. Y. Herald, Nov. 10.

An Egyptian Medical Work.

The Astor Library, New York, has come into possession of a work of extraordinary antiquity. It is a facsimile of an Egyptian medical treatise, written in the sixteenth century B. C., and consequently more than 3,400 years old. Though strictly a medical work, it reveals much relating to ancient Egyptian domestic life, and is one of the most important contributions to the history of medical science ever discovered. The reading public is indebted to the liberality of Mr. William B. Astor for the work.
