IS IT VIRTUALLY AN ALLIANCE?

Secretary Olney Does Not Deny That  
It Is—Views Expressed in Dis-  
cussion and Debate.

LONDON, Jan. 12.—The Chronicle's Washington correspondent says: Secretary Olney, replying to a question of the Russian minister, Mr. de Kozlov, as to whether the abridgment treaty was offensive and defensive, or anything to the nature of an alliance, said that the question might be answered yes, and no.
