

INDIAN WAR VETS RALLY ONCE MORE

Old Campaigners Meet to Elect
Officers and Discuss
Pensions.

COMMITTEE ON LEGISLATION

Commanders Will Take Up Matter of
Enactment of Suitable Law
With Utah's Delegation.

The election of officers for the state organization of the Indian War Veterans occurred last evening at a meeting held in the Fourteenth ward assembly rooms. There was a very fair attendance of representative veterans, there being delegates from nearly all the county commanderies present. J. M. Westwood of Utah county was re-elected commander, as was also R. N. Bennett of Sanpete county, senior vice commander. Virgil Kelley of Millard county was elected junior vice commander; M. L. Pratt of Utah county, adjutant general; George C. Lambert of Salt Lake county, quartermaster-general, and George Harrison of Utah county, state chorister. All were elected to serve for two years.

Commander Westwood announced that the amount and potential question of securing national recognition of the services of the Utah Indian War Veterans had not been forgotten either here in Utah or by Utah's congressmen at the nation's capital. He displayed a bulky package of correspondence which had passed between himself and Utah's delegation, which, though interesting, was altogether too voluminous to read to the assembled veterans. However, that they might be better informed as to the efforts already made and those still in contemplation to secure pensions, two letters each from Senator Smoot and Congressman Howell were read. It appeared from these that Senator Smoot had introduced a bill into the senate providing for pensions for the Utah Indian War Veterans, and that it had passed the upper house of the national legislature without serious opposition, and was now pending in the house. The prospect of its being passed by the representatives, at least in its present form, is less encouraging, not only because of the reputation the house has of contesting nearly every measure that involves an appropriation of public funds, but because there is a deep seated prejudice against granting pensions for army service to any who are not able to prove by the public records that they have been paid for the time serving. It does not necessarily imply that the representatives are less willing to grant pensions to the deserving than are the senators, but they feel that payment for actual service should be precedent to the granting of pension.

Much discussion ensued as to the methods that should be adopted to furnish Congress with the proofs of service and to secure payment of both the per diem and pensions. A motion finally prevailed that the commander and two vice commanders serve as a committee, with such veterans to assist them as they might find it necessary to call upon, to secure the necessary data and present the same to Utah's congressmen, and help by all legitimate means to have the needed measure become a law.

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SAITO CHARGED WITH THEFT.

E. D. Hashimoto Says He Embezzled
\$2,000 in His Absence.

E. D. Hashimoto, manager of a Japanese labor agency in this city, yesterday afternoon swore to a complaint in County Atty. Hanson's office, charging H. Saito, said to be an expert bookkeeper, with embezzling \$2,000 from the agency. A warrant was issued for Saito's arrest.

According to the complaint, Saito took the money while Hashimoto was out of town about two weeks ago. The money was missed and detectives were set to work, and it was learned that Saito had deposited \$1,500 in a local bank under the name of F. H. Saito.

A search of Saito's room at 117 Church street, also disclosed a number of articles said to have been stolen, including shoes, neckties, shirts, etc., which were found in a trunk, together with a bank deposit book showing deposits in Saito's favor of large amounts of money. A number of Hashimoto's checks, made out for \$7 each, were also discovered. Hashimoto says that Saito admitted to him that he stole the money and the goods but afterward denied it.

Saito has five diplomas from business colleges in the east and in Europe and is a graduate of Columbia university.

SHOWS IMPROVEMENT

Paso Robles Hot Springs, Cal., April 4.—Admiral Evans had a comfortable night and this morning took another sulphur bath, followed by massage treatment. His physicians have made a thorough examination and declare that the admiral has no organic trouble.

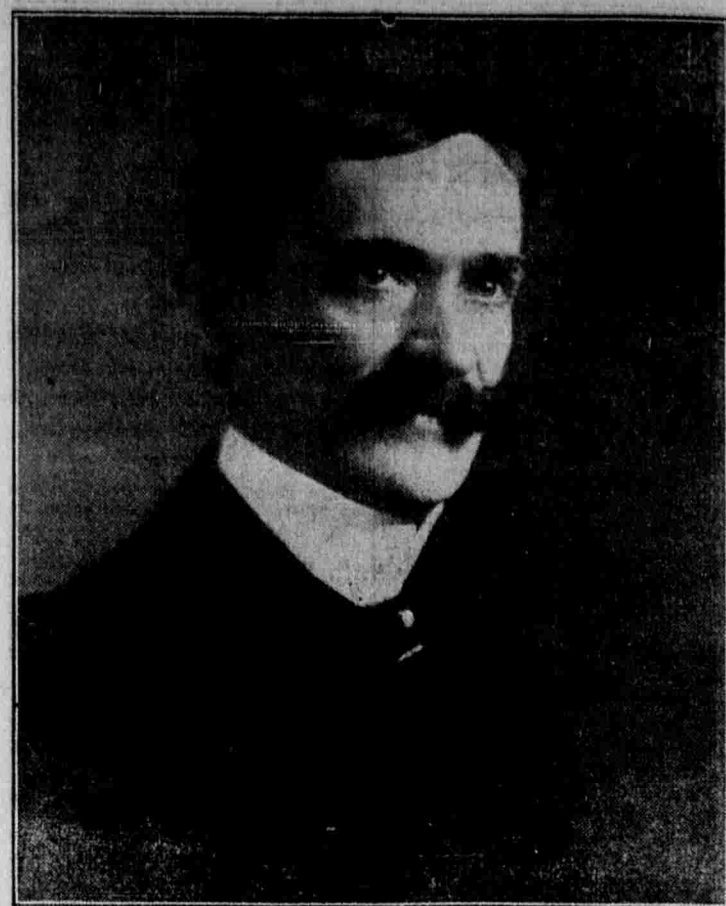
