It is no matter how many institutions they may form, or what kind of oaths, covenants and obligations they may enter into; these means will not restore confidence until the people live pure and holy before God and before each other.

Pres. Kimball made some excellent remarks, after which dancing was resumed.

In the course of the evening, speeches were delivered by members of the Battalion, and the dancing continued until daylight in the morning, when the party was adjourned to July 16th, 1866; and was dismissed by a benediction from Levi Hancock.

EDITOR, DESERET NEWS:

DEAR SIR:—I write to inform you of a severe hail-storm that passed over our city yesterday. A dark cloud was observed coming up from the northwest about 7 o'clock p.m. Its approach was not heralded by any particular demonstration in the way of lightning and thunder or wind, but when it attained a vertical position it poured down the hail in such vast quantities that it seemed as if the "upper deep" had all turned into ice bullets, and had taken the earth for a target to shoot at.

Happily the hail was not very large, or an immense amount of damage would have been done. I think it must have continued falling for as much as fifteen minutes. When the cloud passed off to the southeast it left the ground and house-tops as white with hailstones as you ever saw in winter after a snow-storm. I caught over a barrel of water from the melting of the hail on one side of my house, after the storm passed off. Corn looks as if a battery of guns had played on it a few hours with grape-shot. Vines have suffered very much, and the ground, under my plum trees, is covered with plums.

I am happy to say, however, that all the damage sustained in Payson has been confined to a few gardens and orchards in the extreme southern part of the city. It did not reach our field at all. How far south it extended I cannot say. It has left the air quite cool. We have had more rain this summer than I have ever seen fall before at this season in Utah. Yours, etc.,
