London, Sept. 7.—The Reuter Telegram company publishes a dispatch from St. John, N. F., in which it is said Commander Peary claims that he was the first man to reach the north pole. Washington, Sept. 7.—Through Herbert L. Bridgman, the secretary of the Arctic club, formal official notification of Commander Peary's achievement in reaching the north pole was made known to the government today. Mr. Bridgman sent a dispatch to the secretary of the navy, in which he says that Commander Peary telegraphed from Indian Harbor, Labrador, as follows: "North pole reached April 6 by Peary Arctic club expedition under my command." New York, Sept. 7.—A second message from Commander Peary was received by Herbert L. Bridgman, secretary of the Peary Arctic club, early today. In his message Peary requested Mr. Bridgman to notify the geographical societies throughout the world that the Peary Arctic club expedition had reached the north pole.
