Such papers should not thus be circulated. Under some circum-stances they are calculated to work harm to ladies, and we are of opinion that such a questionable, repulsive and probably injurious method of advertising should not be allowed, or should at least be

curtailed. In this connection it may be well to repeat what we have stated heretofere-that we have about as good skill among our home surgeons, as can generally be found in the country, they having proved their ability in the profession by numerous difficult and delicate operations, in which they have been successful, yet people will run after transient practitioners from abroad, who are not likely to be in advance of them. In fact the probabilities are in the other direction.

We presume if a number of our home surgeons were to combine under the style of some surgical institute with a high sounding name, and travel around as ititerants they would attract as much attention as any others who adopt that system of making money. The amount of success in that capacity does not generally, if ever, depend upon the extent of professional ability, but of pretension.
