**PULLIAM AT OUTS  
WITH HERRMANN**

Squabble Between Baseball Magistrates Over Blacklist Scheme.

### MORE TROUBLE EXPECTED.

Claimed That President of National League Was Too Hasty in His Actions.

President August Herrmann of the national baseball commission declares that President Pulliam of the National league was somewhat hasty in his recent statements in regard to the blacklist which was declared recently against players who have in the past jumped contracts with protected league clubs to play with teams of the so-called outlaw leagues of Pennsylvania. He does not say that the stand taken by President Pulliam was wrong one, but intimates that Pulliam was just a little too hasty in breaking into print on the matter, and that his action was not becoming in one who is at the head of the oldest and highest powers in organized baseball.

The sporting public recognizes Herrmann as the trust of America's prominent sportsmen of today. It looks upon him as a man who carefully weighs his words before having them appear in public print, and it considers it preposterous that he has given him to publication his opinion which shows disapprobation of the action of a man whom he has stood behind for years and always appears to be the warmest friend of at all times.

**SAWS WORDS WERE HASTY.**

Not only does Herrmann deserve that President Pulliam was impulsive, but he also says some of his words sound him as suggestive of a man too ready to make public utterances without carefully investigating matters as a man should do.

In other words, the president of the National league and the man who heads the highest tribunal in baseball are at loggerheads. President Pulliam, however, petulantly, a southerner, has declared that he will resign rather than see such an injustice done the players blacklisted, and Herrmann intimates that if Pulliam carries on his threats he will be forced to present his resignation twice so far as he (Herrmann) is concerned.

Some wonderful athletic feats are on record under such circumstances. For instance, John Eisele, the great Princeton runner, ran over a mile while almost totally blind in the college cross-country championships and did well.

He had been troubled with an affection of the facial muscles, and the strain of the seven-mile race aggravated the trouble so much that the optic nerve was partially paralyzed.

Elsewhere known as a course like a book and ran on in his blindness, until Trainer Copeland saw his plight and dragged him out of the race.

Another great running feat under a terrible handicap was the winning of the 80-yard metropolitan championship by Charles Bacon in 1894. He ran 100 feet to the mark and triumphed the best of the New York half-milers in 2:32 3-5.

To watch the peerless Hillman glide along the flat on over hurdles one would scarcely believe that he is a paralytic cripple, but he has such a bad shoulder that he can scarcely throw a ball across the diamond in a line. Water-polo players, though not so handicapped, strain on the injured limb, but Hillman, like many other hurdlers, suffers with chafing on the knee. He is also sun-singed and wears spectacles in all his hurdle races.

Heath, the great Michigan broad jumper, competes with only one arm, having lost the best part of the other. Yet he is considered the 22nd best jumper in the world.

**President of Professional Baseball Leagues Starts the Trouble and Then the National League Took up the Fight.**

President Pulliam of the National league and President Johnson of the American league and President Herrmann of the national commission talked together for hours yesterday in New York, being brought together by a special meeting of the national commission, of which all three are members.

**WARM WORDS AT MEETING.**

They refused to say anything for publication, but it was learned that their discussion was pretty warm at times, and that President Johnson took the stand that the blacklisted players deserved the punishment but that Pulliam was in the stand which he has taken that it was unwise to publish a blacklist and lay the organization liable to damages from the players, should they sue.

The rules committee met last night in New York, and after the meeting it was announced that no changes in rules were made that would be of interest to the public.

Todays magnates of the National league will convene at the Waldorf-Astoria and the American leaguers magnates will meet at the Hotel Plaza to discuss the three blocks away. The American league is expected to adopt a schedule today or tomorrow and the National league will adopt its schedule during the twenty-four hours following in accordance with an agreement between the two organizations.

It is announced that there will be fewer conflicting dates than ever before since the American league placed teams in towns represented in the National League.
