CONGRESS' POWER TO PUNISH. Gen. B. F. Tracey Holds it is Ade-

quate to Meet Crimes Like Czolgosz's

New York, Sept. 12.-Gen. Benjamin Tracy holds that Congress has power to pass a law providing for absolute punishment for crimes like that of Czolgosz's without any constitutional amendments.

Gen. Tracy is quoted as saying:

"It has been suggested that a crime such as that which startled the whole country last Friday should be made treason. It is impossible for treason in this country is clearly defined and limited by the constitution itself to armed resistance to the power of the government or to giving aid and com-

There is such a thing as a breach of the peace of the United States, to be distin-guished from a breach of the peace of the commonwealth or state, and the federal government undoubted-by has the pawer to prescribe a suitable ly has the pawer to prescribe a suitable penalty for a breach of the peace."

BOERS ATTACK BRITISH.

Catch Col. Monroe's Column Unawares in a Deep Pass.

Pretoria, Sept. 12 .- While Col. Monroe's column was returning from Bar-key East to Dordrecht It was attacked by the Boers under Commandants Fouchee and Myburg in Wolvekloof. The advance guard was well in the pass when a terrific fire was opened upon them from the heights about the Kloof, The British were in a precarious port-tion on the flat where there was little or no cover, but they rapidly unlim-bered and returned a brisk fire. The fighting continued for some time. The British had four wounded. It is report-ed that the Boers had four killed and

a considerable number wounded. On the following morning a recon-noitering force with big guns cleared Wolvekloof of the Boers who retreated in the direction of Drakensburg. The British followed the burghers for a con-siderable distance shalling them incom siderable distance shelling them inces-
