

New York, 6. Specials from Montreal report a serious riot among the Irish at Griffintown. A great many were wounded and three seriously beaten.

Hartford, Conn., 6. A passenger train on the Nagatuck railroad broke through the bridge across the Winsted branch of the river, two miles from Thomaston. Sixteen persons were in the car and were swept into the Nagatuck and carried over the dam at Thomaston. Ten persons are supposed to be drowned; six bodies have been recovered; one was Lucius Skinner, Adams' Express Agent, of Winsted. A son of G. W. Sperry, of Walcottsville, 15 years old, was among the drowned; his body has been recovered. The stores and factories of Thomaston are closed, all being engaged in hunting for the bodies.

Lawrence, Kansas, 6. Elizabeth Cady Stantan and Susan B. Anthony, of New York, addressed a very large audience here last night, on female suffrage.

Advices from the Indian territory state that the cholera has broken out, raging violently among the wild indians of the Plains.

The State Fair will be held here, commencing on the 24th inst. The yield of all kinds of produce this season was never before equalled.

Hartford, 6. The dam of the West Hartford reservoir, six miles from the city, which supplied the city with water, was washed away this morning, sweeping with tremendous force over the corn fields and pasture lands, bearing huge lines of fences with it; for two miles the fields were flooded and the valleys below the stream are covered with sand, rocks and other debris. The damage to private property is considerable. The loss to the city will be \$100,000. The dam carried away was 55 feet high from the bed of the brook and 200 feet wide.

Many bridges have gone, interrupting travel. The branch road to Collingsville has

been in some places submerged or swept away, and the trains to-day are interrupted.

Two dams in Bristel, owned by Ingraham & Co., clock manufacturers, have been carried away, causing a loss of \$10,000.
