A police as good as that of London could do much to abate the terrible evil of drunkenness in New York. While the London police look sharplyafter the criminals and the drunkards, they have the men and the time to spare for a careful watch of the streets. As London grows, her narrow ways become more and more crowded by vehicles and pedestrians, and the dangers of crossing multiply. In 1874 not less than 124 persons were killed under the wheels, and 2,500 knocked down and injured. The duty of guarding against these accidents is much lighter in this city, and our police cannot offer that as an excuse for their weakness in contending with criminals. Many reasons could be given for the great superiority of the police of London over that of New York. Two may be mentioned. One is the exceeding care taken in the choice of the men. They are selected for their physical strength and courage and their good previous character, and politics has nothing whatever to do with the appointments. The area of the island is 20,819,947 acres, from which are to be deducted 600,000 acres, covered with water, and 4,000,000 of bogs, mountains and other lands unfit for cultivation, leaving available about 19,000,000 acres, or 25,000 square miles, an area somewhat less than half of Iowa. Ten million acres lare, again, in pasture, so that the cultivated land but little exceeds one acre for each inhabitant, the total population being 5,412,377. In 1841 the population was 8,175,000, the number of inhabited houses being 1,320,000. Now there are but 960,-000 houses returned, so that the population has fallen off 2,763,000 souls, and the number of dwellings 360,000. 


