Representative Levi P. Morton, Senator Cameron, Wm. E. Chandler and Hon. Marshall Jewell also called on Garfield. Every one who asked for the President-elect was shown to his apartment until 12 o'clock, when he went out for a drive. This evening Gen. Garfield dined with Representative Chittenden, of New York, and afterwards attended a card reception of that gentleman. Many prominent democrats were present. The guests included Prest. Hayes, Vice-President Wheeler, Vice President-elect Arthur, Gen. Sherman, Secretaries Sherman, Evarts, Ramsay and Attorney General Devens. Sir Edward Thornton was present. Officers and soldiers of the Army of the Cumberland in the city, came to meet at the City Hall to-morrow.

NEW YORK, 3.—The Graphic says: Not a few people came down this morning expecting to sell stocks and receive a profit on the passage of the funding bill. From the very opening, however, there were orders to take all offerings, and instead of weakness there was a strong tone which developed buoyancy, when at the end of the first half hour news came that the veto of the funding bill had been written out, and just here one of the inconsistencies that characterize the course of speculation manifested itself. Those who had bought stocks in the hope of the passage of the funding as a measure of inflation began to buy on the vetoing of the bill. Shorts took alarm and were driven to cover by the manipulations of operators, who yesterday and the day before were the principal buyers of stocks. There is little doubt that the advance today was due mainly to the closing out of short accounts, for the report was freely circulated that a funding amendment shorn of all obnoxious features would be tacked on to the deficiency bill and passed to-day. The situation in other respects has not changed.

So great has been the increase in the number of messages offering here that the Western Union Company has been compelled to borrow operators for its main office from the American Union and Atlantic and Pacific offices. The Commercial Bulletin, in its financial article says the day opened at the Stock Exchange on the news that the funding bill had passed the House in the same form that it came from the Senate which made stocks weak. Then news came that the treasury will buy (at supposed market prices) \$5,000,000 of 5 and 6 per cent. bonds on Wednesday. This strengthened the market as did also the later news that the President had vetoed the refunding bill. Later in the day the decision of Judge Blatchford refusing to grant an injunction to restrain the Western Union Telegraph consolidation, and the report that Judge Sedwick had so far modified the recent injunction granted by him, that 48 1/2 per cent. of the scrip declared as dividend to the Western Union Telegraph shareholders could be issued, gave great strength to telegraph stocks, and the result of all was a general rise in stocks, declining from 1 to 1/2 per cent for holding stocks. United States bonds advanced 3/4 and 7/8. The treasury, in the last ten days has taken about \$18,000,000 lawful money, placed there by banks giving up note circulation. It has paid out for bonds bought about \$6,000,000, so it retains about \$12,000,000 which has been taken from bank reserves. This money, if it should remain in the Treasury, will cause a stringent loan market, and the question is how to get out. The report was current that the treasurer would return to the banks which have given up their circulation the lawful money which they had deposited to redeem their notes. Later it was officially announced that he will return the greenbacks to those banks which may have deposited them, provided the bonds which may have secured their circulation still remain on deposit and none of the circulation of the bank has been redeemed from the deposit. He declined, however, to surrender greenbacks upon the redeposit of bonds. If five per cent. bonds are again deposited new certificates must be issued. If the money cannot be got back into the banks in this way then the only other way is to buy bonds at the market price to the extent of \$12,000,000. This would restore the

banks to the condition they were in ten days ago, or before the Senate passed the refunding bill. If the Treasury buys more than \$12,000,000 then the amount beyond will make the banks proportionately better off than they were ten days ago.

The Times says: The action of President Hayes in vetoing the refunding bill was variously received on the street, according to the prejudices of persons interested. H. C. Fahnestock, of the First National Bank, which has been regarded as the champion of the opponents of the refunding bill, said yesterday afternoon, that the bill would have been favored by the banking men, notwithstanding the doubt of many as to its ultimate success, had it not been for the fifth section; with this clause, it could not have been a failure. It was a bad policy to antagonize banks, without whose co-operation the placing of a 3 per cent bond would be a failure. In any event, if such a funding bill, with such provisions as were contained in the objectionable fifth clause, had been passed a year ago, to take effect to-day, it would be a different matter. The notice given was too short, and banks were compelled, in their own defense, to fight its passage. Should the act be passed, to-day, to fund the debt on the basis of a 3 1/2 per cent. bond, there would not be the slightest doubt as to its success.

The Baltimore & Ohio and Pennsylvania roads are crowded with trains bearing people to Washington to witness the inauguration ceremonies.

Judge Blatchford, in the United States Circuit Court, to-day, rendered a decision in the trials brought by the Direct Cable Company and the French Cable Company, to restrain the consolidation of the Western Union and other telegraph companies. Judge Blatchford entirely refuses to grant to either of the two cable companies any relief whatever. He also refused to grant to either of them upon anything that has been said up to this day any relief upon their amended bills, asking an order to restrain the Western Union Telegraph Company from violating any condition of the cable contracts made with the two land companies, to which it now succeeds. The Judge is reported as having ruled that the Western Union can issue its certificates for 48 1/2 per cent. This practically accomplishes all that is required to complete the consolidation.

The World's City of Mexico correspondent says: The Mormons, who perhaps anticipate difficulties with the new regime about to be inaugurated at home, are here again endeavoring to procure lands for a large colony of the Saints. So far the Mexican government has taken no action in the matter, but may when Congress assembles.

London dispatches say: The Times gives the following account of an Irishman who is described by a correspondent as the chief advisor of Joubert, the boy commander. His name is Alfred Aylward. He was for some time connected with James Stevens, Fenian head centre. A correspondent of the Times, who was in Natal, says Aylward disapproved of their plans, as he thought the time for assassination and revolt was inopportune, and informed the committee if they resolved to murder Lord Mayo he should inform him of his danger. Aylward then sent a note to Lord Mayo, telling him not to pass through the Castle yard that afternoon. Aylward was that night shot by a Fenian as an informer, and was taken to the hospital wounded. A correspondent met Aylward, who told him how he had secretly severed his connection with the Fenian movement in Ireland. His story is as follows: At a meeting of the central committee, Stevens presiding, at which Aylward was present, it was decided to assassinate Lord Mayo, then chief secretary for Ireland, as he passed out from the Castle Yard, Dublin, and to attack Chester Castle, for the purpose of procuring arms in the two places. The police discovered who wrote the letters to Lord Mayo, and when Aylward recovered, he was placed under police protection, and accepted an offer of money from the secretary of the jail on condition of his leaving the country. Aylward then left Ireland and went to South Africa. He has been long known in Africa as a strong sympathizer with the Dutch. When, in 1866, the Boers being at war with Lecoceni, wanted an officer, Aylward volunteered. At the fight at Waherakloop he was serving with the Lydenberg, and on the death of their captain, succeeded to the com-

mand. He is author of "The Transvaal of To-day," in which he gives a sketch of recent Boer wars, and describes the habits of the people. He was, up to quite recently, editor of the Natal Witness, published at Pietermaritzburg.

In the House of Commons, Dillon said, if he were an Irish farmer he would keep a rifle to shoot the landlords. Shouts of "Oh." He wished the Irish had proclaimed civil war. The Speaker called him to order. Harcourt declared that his former attacks were fully justified by Dillon's language in a previous debate. Wm. Baxter, liberal, for Montrose, gave notice that he would ask Gladstone whether, despite the new rules, the usual necessary business of the House was not virtually stopped? Government intended to propose measures which would effectually end obstruction. Healy was repeatedly called to order for charging Harcourt with uttering untruths. He was eventually named by the Speaker, and his suspension voted for by 233 to 15. During this scene Parnell entered the House.

Dillon said he had never expressed approval of assassination. Dwyer Gray and McCoan, home-rulers, regretted Dillon's language, and disavowed any sympathy with illegal means for promoting the League agitation.

John McCarthy, liberal member of the last Parliament, for Mallow, and in favor of home government for Ireland, writes to newspapers, that Parnell's policy has achieved two things only, cloture and coercion. It has retarded the introduction of the land bill, alienated tenants' friends, and alarmed all classes, by communistic theories. His policy has proved abortive, obstruction is checkmated, withholding rent is proving impossible, foreign alliances are proving disgraceful and the deepest instincts of Irishmen have been wounded, by seeking an alliance among atheists of England, conspirators of America and communists of Paris. This is not merely failure; it is disaster and dishonor.
