ENTER STORMY PROTEST

Merchants Object to Show of Discrimination and Granting of Special Privileges.

Hardware dealers and mining machinery firms who were compelled by enforcement of the city ordinance to remove all wares from the sidewalks in front of their premises, were not satisfied when they saw that favoritism was shown in the matter. It was found that the Salt Lake Hardware company, with which firm Chamberlain Block is associated, was not complying with the law. Consequently a letter was addressed to the council, calling that body's attention to the matter. The letter, like some other important communications of late, was intercepted after reaching the hands of the recorder and before presentation to the council.

Finding that nothing was being done to place all persons on an equal footing in regard to the ordinance mentioned, another letter has been sent to the mayor and council, reading as follows:

"Salt Lake City, Utah, July 15, 1908.

"To the Hon. Mayor and City Council, Salt Lake City, Utah.

"Sir—Some months ago the undersigned were ordered to remove all pieces of machinery occupying sidewalk space in front of their respective places of business. We were glad to comply with this request believing it would assist in a great measure to help beautify the principal streets of this city.

"Certainly machinery houses on Second South street have not complied with this order and the sidewalk display is being increased from time to time.

"We understand certain ordinances prohibit the use of sidewalk spaces for this purpose and we respectfully petition your honor to enforce the ordinance against all dealers in machinery and not discriminate in favor of one dealer over another.

IS MAKING MANY IMPROVEMENTS

Church Completes Paving of Street East of Temple Block.

WALL RECEIVES IRON COVER.

Big Barn Being Removed to Make Way for New Gymnasium—Old Landmark to be Preserved.

The latest of a series of extended improvements being made by the Church upon and around the district comprised in the Temple block and the titling office block just to the eastward, is the covering of the southern portion of the Temple block wall with heavy galvanized iron. For several years erosions in the wall have been making through the action of the elements and the wish of the presidency of the Church that the wall be retained in as intact a form as possible, has been carried out by the presiding bishop, and the experiment of covering the wall with iron is being tried, and if it proves to be what is claimed for it as a means of protection, the other three sides of the wall will receive similar covering later on.

The wall will also receive a coating of cement plaster on its outer face, and when finished will present a pleasing and attractive appearance as well as preserve to future generations one of the landmarks left by the pioneers who built the foundations of the city.

PAVING COMPLETED.

Among the other improvements around the block may be mentioned the magnificent piece of paving which has just been completed on Main street between North and South Temple streets. This work was done by P. J. Moran, and together with other improvements made at the same time, the Church, cost upwards of \$20,000. On each side of the street beautiful lawns have been planted and trees set out, making a park effect on each side of the main street.

Before the paving work was finished a large cement conduit, 4½ feet, was placed under the street, and this will contain the water, heating and lighting pipes and the experiment of covering the system of Church building and improvements shall have reached that stage.

NEW GYMNASIUM.

To make way for the new L. D. S. gymnasium, for which plans have been approved and the contracts for construction will be let in a few days, the large barn in the center of the titling office block, which was erected some years ago at a cost of about \$12,000, is being removed and torn down.

The new gymnasium will be 90x150 feet by 60 feet in height, will include a locker room, swimming pool and gymnasium, and will cost \$150,000.

Work is proceeding upon the new administration building, which fronts on Main street, and altogether the improvements being made upon Church property are keeping pace with the growth of the times and the growth of the city.

WAYNE COUNTY PROSPERING.

Bishop David A. Smith and Party Return from Interesting Trip.

Heavy thunderstorms, accompanied by cloudbursts, is the story brought back from southern Utah by David A. Smith of the presiding bishopric, who has been spending ten days in Wayne and adjacent counties. On the return trip home over the Sanpete Valley branch of the Utah & Northern Pacific, the latter in two places, the cars plowed their way through a sea of mud and water after section hands had cleared the tracks of rocks, poles and boulders that had been washed down from the mountains that flank the track some two miles adjacent.

In Wayne county the outlook for crops is decidedly promising, the only problem confronting the farmers being the daily thunderstorm which makes having out of the question.

Bishop Smith, accompanied by Atty. Carl A. Badger, Frank B. Woodbury and Geo. E. Carpenter, has been spending a vacation on the Fish Lake forest reserve, where fishing has been excellent. Judging from the number of sage hens, quail and deer encountered when the shooting season opens, southern Utah will be a veritable sportsman's paradise. During their stay at Lake Powell, the party made headquarters at the ranch of President G. S. Bastian on Thousand Lake mountain, in the heart of the stock raising country.

The celebration of Pioneer day at Loa, the seat of Wayne county, was characteristic and included a parade, appropriate exercises in the school-house, horse and foot races and a fireworks display between the married and single ladies clad in bifurcated skirts in which the splinters tumbled the matrons to the tune of an unending and raucous.

During the outing the party traveled over 200 miles by team.

WILL TEAR UP MAIN STREET.

Plan to Resurface Thoroughfare is Again Being Agitated.

The matter of resurfacing Main street, from South Temple to Fourth South street, is again to be agitated. Property owners favorable to the proposition claim that their ranks have been added to by persons who fought down the proposition a few weeks ago.

Those who have changed their minds have done so, it is said, upon the assurance that the street will be permitted

to remain unimproved when repaired, and not be subject to being torn up unnecessarily for the laying of pipes and mains.

Mayor Bradford is back of the new movement to resurface, and is working with a view of getting the co-operation of a sufficient number of taxpayers to make the project feasible. The executive committee is endeavoring to effect the removal of all poles from Main street in the immediate future.

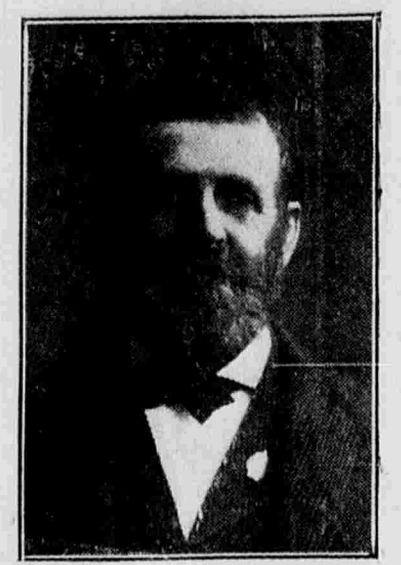

Robert J. Knight Laid to Rest After Largely Attended Service in Twentieth Ward.

The funeral of Robert J. Knight, the veteran fireman, was held yesterday afternoon in the Twentieth ward meetinghouse with burial in the city cemetery. The funeral was attended by many of the old fire ladders and members of the present department. There were many floral offerings. The open-

ing prayer was by David A. Lyon, and the list of speakers included Arthur Parsons, Hamilton G. Park, ex-Chief George M. Ottigera, John Burton, James Solomon, James E. Frisbie, with Bishop George Romney presiding. The pallbearers were Capt. Morton, Capt. Fitzgerald and Fireman Peckes of the paid fire department and James Peacock, S. A. Skidmore and William Cardwell of the volunteer department. The benediction was by R. F. Neslen.

The deceased died last Monday night from a complication of troubles which have afflicted him in the past. He was born in Devonport, near Portsmouth, Eng. 65 years ago, coming to Utah in 1864, and locating in the Twentieth ward, Salt Lake, where he resided to the day of his death. Mr. Knight was at first a shoemaker, but later went into the grocery business. He joined the Wasatch Engine company, on its organization in 1873, and officiated as its steward until 1883. He was in the paid fire department as a member of the board of trustees, and at the time of his death had been vice president for three years. "Bobby" Knight, as he was familiarly called, will be much missed. The old veterans are gradually answering the last call, and are responding to their names in a better world.
