These two companies finally absorbed the re-duction business of the district and in the early part of 1890 the Richmond suspended work, the Eureka Con. con-tinuing its reduction works until the fall of 1891. Prices Fell Sharply in Spots and Rose Vigorously on Supporting Orders.

New York, Feb. 29 .- Opening changes in the stock market today from last night's

prices were generaly small, with gains predominating. The hard and soft coal carriers were exceptions and were a small iraction lower on the decision of the supreme court regarding rights of coal carriers to deal in that commodity. Southern Pacific and Great Northern preferred rose 2 and Brooklyn Transit, Sugar and Pressed Steel Car preferred large fracions.

METAL MARKET HIGHER.

Notwithstanding the extraction of this decreased tonnage, the difference in receipts in favor of 1903, was only \$576,214.12. This showing is due to the healthful condition of the metal market. The operating costs have also been reduced, and, with these two items taken into consideration, the increase in the surplus may readily be accounted for. General Manager Ernest Bamberger, in his report to shareholders at the meeting in Denver yesterday, stated that the developments of the year, on account of the stoppage of the Ontario drain tunnel, have necessarily been confined to the upper levels, owing to the intrusion of water in the lower levels. A GOOD SELECTION.

TONOPAH ORES.

Mina, Nevada. May Become Location For Smelting Works.

There is much significance attached There is much significance attached to the recent acquisition by the Tono-pah Mining company of the Dunlap-Stewart copper mine, situated twelve miles east of Mina, the new western terminal of the Tonopah Railroad, says the Miner of Tonopah. The majority of the people in this country have been so busy in the handling of stocks and claims that they have paid but ittle claims that they have paid but little attention to the metallurgical problem that is being solved by some of Tono-

pah's big mining companies. Extensive tests hve been made on our ores in an endeavor to adapt to them an economical leaching or mill-ing process, but the result has invariably been, as elsewheer with similar ores, that smelting has proved to be the most econmical treatment, when lime or other basic ores are available to use as a flux, thereby killing two birds with one stone. The Tonopah Mining company is now in a positoin to follow this course by using the basic copper ores of the Stewart-Dunlap mine to neutralize its siliceous Tonopah ores in a copper matte smelter. The copper district near the new camp of Garnet, lying within sight of Tonopah and only forty miles to the northwest, can supply a quantity and suitable variety of copper ores carrying lime and iron oxide, sufficient to flux the entire product of the Tonopah and Goldfield dis-tricts. This new camp holds the key to Tonopah's fuller development, since it will enable our mine-owners to do their own smelting near home.

Just now the camp of Eureka, Nev., is of more than ordinary interest to local mining men because of the activ-ity of the United States Smelting, Reining & Mining company in that dis-

The Sentinel of that place gives space

The sentine of that place gives space to a brief historical sketch in a recent issue, and says: "Eureka, the capital of Eureka coun-ty, center of population, and supply point for this entire section, occupies so point for this entire section, occupies so conspicuous a place in history that it is entitled to a short sketch. The town is situated in a canyon between Dia-mond and Prospect mountains, at an elevation of about 6,500 feet above the sea. It is connected with the Southern Pacific at Palisade by the Eureka & Dultade a 90-mile narrow-gas soli-Pacific at Palisade by the Eureka & Palisade, a 90-mile narrow-gage rali-way. This road was built in 1874-5, paid for itself the first year and has since been in successful operation. From a few tents and log cabins in 1869, Eureka became the second town in the state within nine years, and in 1878 its population numbered 7,000 or more. Many fine buildings graced the streets, the stone quarries within the town limits and the brick yards fur-nishing abundant building maperial.
