

GIRL DIVULGES MURDER MYSTERY

Lorenzaw Tawser, in Fear of Death, Tells How Harry Keener Killed a Man.

HELPED DISMEMBER BODY.

He Confesses Crime and in Explanation Says Stranger Threatened To Kill Him.

York, Pa., Jan. 14.—Harry Keener, a York county farmer, confessed today that the story told by a girl of this city that he had killed a man on his farm last July is true. The identity of the victim is still unknown. The girl accused Keener while she was lying on what was believed to be her death-bed.

The girl is Miss Lorenzaw Tawser, aged 15. Last summer she was employed on Keener's farm, near Seven Valley. Last week she attended the murder trial in this city of a one-armed negro. After going home she was seized with spasms, and, fearing she would die, gave a detailed account of Keener's alleged crime to her mother. Her reason for not telling of the killing sooner, she said, was that she had been sworn to secrecy by Keener.

The girl said that after Keener had killed the man, he buried the body in the orchard. Today, after much questioning by the police, Keener admitted the crime. Keener said his victim was a stranger, who came to his house in the night and, without apparent provocation, threatened to kill him. He said he shot through the glass in the door of his home and killed him. He then buried the body, he said, in the orchard, but the odor of the body caused him to take it up. He then tried to dispose of it by burning, but in this he was not successful. Keener says the Tawser girl then helped him cut up the body and assisted in its burial. He said the arms and legs were separated from the trunk and were buried at different points. A portion of the body was buried in the cellar of the home, other parts were buried on the farm of his father, some miles away.

Keener and the girl were taken to the scene of the crime today. The finding of ashes and portions of bones there corroborated the confession made by the farmer. Keener is 23 years old and a widower. Keener's father died several months ago and left an estate of about \$4,000 in trust for the son. Two years ago Keener was married, but a separation occurred a year later and he lived on the farm with Miss Tawser, as his housekeeper. Since the killing, Keener advertised in matrimonial papers and again married. He was living with his mother several miles from the farm when arrested.

GOMPERS AND LABOR LEADERS AT WHITE HOUSE

Washington, Jan. 14.—President Roosevelt and the members of the executive council of the American Federation of Labor had a long conference today upon the subject of right of asylum in the United States for political refugees, and went into a number of cases now pending before the state department. The labor leaders present were Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison, John B. Lewis, Eugene Thomas, John Mitchell, James O'Connell, Max Morris, D. A. Hayes, William D. Huber, John F. Valentine and John R. Albright. The facts in the specific cases taken up were laid before the president in written form, and he expressed his sympathy with the labor representatives. What are known as the Mexican extradition cases for alleged breach of nationality laws and the case of Jan Popen were particularly gone into. The case of Rodriguez and one or two others were overlooked, but will be submitted by letter. At the conclusion of the conference President Gompers made a statement of the results accomplished by the interview, except this: "The president expressed himself in entire sympathy with the purpose of the matter as presented to him, and will have a careful investigation made, but expressed dissent from the criticism of Gen. Porfirio Diaz."

OREGON SENATORSHIP.

Big Fight to Defeat Chamberlain, People's Choice.
Portland, Jan. 14.—The controversy over the United States senatorship and the election of a man in succession, Charles W. Fulton, in developing into a fight between the Chamberlain men and the anti-Chamberlain men and to some thirty men sent to Washington instead of the people's choice. George B. PLUNGED INTO LAKE.

Locomotive Ran Into Snowdrift, Went Into Water, Two Men Drowned.

Vancouver, B. C., Jan. 14.—Carrying its engine and fireman with it, the locomotive of a westbound Canadian Pacific freight train ran into a snowdrift at Three Valley Lake, 29 1/2 miles east of Vancouver, at full speed, at 3 o'clock this morning, and plunged down the embankment and into the lake. Both men were pinned in the cab of the engine and were drowned. It is reported here that the locomotive went into the lake, which is said to be about 20 feet deep at this point, rapidly sinking to a greater depth a short distance from shore. It is said that Coughlin was the engineer's name, but the identity of the fireman is not known. Both men were residents of Revelstoke.

TERRIFIC MINE DISASTER IN HUNGARY

Veszperem, Hungary, Jan. 14.—In an explosion of fire damp in the Auska coal mine here today, which was followed later by a dust explosion and fire, 20 men were entombed. Sixteen living miners and the bodies of 10 dead persons thus far have been brought out of the pit. The fire has been held to one locality, and it is hoped that the remainder of the entombed miners will be rescued alive.

FEET AND HANDS FROZEN AFTER DESPERATE FIGHT

Helena, Mont., Jan. 14.—A special from Leonard, Mont., to the Record says: A Polish-German, 42 years old, giving his name as Jankov Bricatic was found just west of here this morning covered with blood and his hands, feet and hands frozen. He was brought to Leonard, where the frozen parts were thawed as he told his story. He and Tony Holly had worked for the Clemens Ditch company and were walking east from Toston. At Brewer Holly opened fire on him and battered him with his revolver and took his entire savings. One bullet hit Bricatic in the head just above the right ear and came out at the top of his head. He also has a bullet in each arm near the shoulder. The back of his head was badly battered by the butt of Holly's revolver. Bricatic says it happened about 8 o'clock this morning and he walked nearly four miles after he had been shot.

ADMIRAL ROJESTVENSKY'S DEATH ANNOUNCED

St. Petersburg, Jan. 14.—The death of Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky is announced. He was in command of the Russian fleet in the Pacific when it was practically annihilated by the Japanese in the battle of the Sea of Japan.

Rojestvensky, a Russian naval officer, was born in 1828. He was a member of the Russian navy, and served in the greater part of his life in the Pacific. He was promoted to admiral in 1894. DEMOCRATS CALL ON DUDGE TAFT

Told Them Willing to Forget Everything of the Past That Ought to be Forgotten.

CONSTITUTION IS ALL RIGHT.

Has Been Capable of Such Fair Construction as to Meet Emergencies of the Country.

Augusta, Ga., Jan. 14.—One hundred and eighty men, who said they were Democrats, citizens of Anderson, S. C., visited the president-elect today. They left enthusiastic in the belief that their town is to be placed on the southern itinerary of Mr. Taft when he travels next fall. Ten men from Thompson, Ga., all confederate veterans, called Mr. Taft's attention to the cotton tax levied on several southern states after the war and collected to the total of \$68,000,000. The supreme court declared the tax unconstitutional, and although Congress has been asked repeatedly to refund the money, it has not done so. Mr. Taft, in his address to the Anderson delegation, referred to the growing prosperity of the south, under which "we are willing to let bygones be bygones and forget everything of the past that we ought to forget."

"He had no quarrel because his enemies were Democrats, remarking that under our form of government parties were necessary 'sometimes' for making effectively the republic. "All we can hope for," he added, "all that we ought to ask, is that the people of all sections shall make up their minds in an independent way and then vote for the principles they favor." Asserting his position regarding the effectiveness of the Constitution to meet the needs of a developing civilization, Mr. Taft said: "I know that sometimes the Constitution seems to be in the way of direct effectiveness. The development under a system by which the central government is limited to certain things and the state government to carry on other things, something remains to be done against the rapid carrying out of some of the reforms, as, for instance, the conserving of our natural resources and perhaps the regulation of railroads and the suppression of those abuses which have crept in with our marvelous progress in the combination of capital. And yet, gentlemen, that Constitution, clear, simple and comprehensive, has in the past been capable of such fair construction as to meet in a marvelous way the developments and emergencies of our country which could not have been anticipated by those who framed it, in any detail at all, and I am very certain the same Constitution will meet the emergency which now confronts the future."

"What we look to in the north is to have the support of those institutions from the people who believe in them and are willing to maintain them and to fight for them if necessary."

ONE JUDGE THREATENS TO REMOVE ANOTHER

Chicago, Jan. 15.—A clash has developed in the municipal court over the peculiar parole methods of Judge Cleland, who has achieved fame by his heart-to-heart talks with prisoners and the holding of a "stuffed cup" over their heads in the way of a suspended sentence pending an effort of reformation. "I am not responsible to Justice Olson, but to the people of Chicago for the manner in which I conduct my court," is Judge Cleland's rejoinder, "and I expect in the future to conduct it as I have in the past in strict consistency with the law."


