

NICARAGUA MUST MAKE EXPLANATION

State Department Delivers Preliminary Note to Charge d'Affaires of the Legation.

TAFT THOROUGHLY AROUSED

Zelaya's Attitude Unsatisfactory—Overthrow of His Government Would be Welcomed.

Washington, Nov. 18.—Announcement that this government is tired of the high-handed action of small Central American republics, practically was contained in a dispatch sent late today to the Bluefields Steamship company, which sought the protection of the state department from interference by insurgents now operating against President Zelaya.

An hour later a preliminary note, couched in diplomatic language, but none the less direct, was delivered to Señor Felipe Rodríguez, charge d'affaires of the Nicaraguan legation, demanding a full and complete explanation of the execution of two Americans, Leonard Grace and Leroy Cannon, killed by order of Zelaya, when they were found in the insurgent army. NEW MINISTER NOT RECOGNIZED

Pending a satisfactory explanation of the occurrence, President Taft has refused to recognize Isidore Hazaña, new

Nicaraguan minister. Mr. Taft is thoroughly aroused by actions of the Zelayan government and apparently is determined to make the lives of American citizens much safer and much more respected in Central America than they have been hitherto.

The attitude of the government was clearly shown late today, when the state department sent a dispatch to the Bluefields Steamship company, the headquarters of which is in New Orleans. The company's regular steamer was about to set sail for Bluefields, with a miscellaneous cargo, in which were a number of rifles and other munitions of war. The corporation was warned by agents of the Nicaraguan insurrectionary forces that the vessel would be liable to seizure, and the steamship people promptly called on the state department to declare the protection of this government in such cases.

The state department replied promptly. The answer was the result of a conference between the president and the secretary of state and carried full weight.

It gave the steamship company an encouragement and practically recognized the revolutionary forces operating against the Zelayan administration, a proceeding for which there probably is no parallel in the records of this government.

The dispatch, directed to the steamship company at New Orleans, and signed, "Knox, secretary of state," read:

"It is the announced blockade or investment of the Nicaraguan port of San Juan del Norte (Greytown) is effectively maintained, and the requirements of international law, including warning to approaching vessels, are observed, this government would not be disposed to interfere to prevent its enforcement. A naval vessel will be ordered to Greytown to observe and report whether the blockade is in effect."

NICARAGUA TROUBLE MAKER.

Nicaragua has given this government more trouble in the last few years than any other, save, perhaps, Venezuela.

The attitude of the United States, as shown by its apparent recognition of the Nicaraguan insurgents, indicates to diplomats that this government would welcome the overthrow of the present administration. It is known that President Zelaya's attitude toward America and American interests for some time has been anything but satisfactory.

The state department today maintained a reserve that was described by one diplomat as "ominous."

It was learned, however, that both President Taft and Secretary Knox practically have determined on the execution of some forceful moral lesson, if nothing more, with a view of bringing Central American states to a realization of their responsibilities.

Amidst acknowledging that a demand had been made on the Nicaraguan legation for a detailed and comprehensive report of the killing of the two Americans, the department declined to discuss the existing crisis.

The execution of the Americans is held here to be indefensible. In the absence of complete details this government is reserving judgment, but if the men were captured in the ranks of the enemy with arms in their hands, they were entitled to military trial, under international law. It is inconceivable to officials that either man was acting as a spy.

While no orders have been issued for the dispatch of war vessels other than the Des Moines and the Vicksburg to observe conditions on both the Atlantic and Pacific coasts, there are plenty of vessels in Caribbean waters that can be sent to the scene on the shortest notice, while there are other vessels within call on the Pacific coast. It is evident that the temper of the administration has been thoroughly aroused, and if occasion warrants the state department may advise drastic action.

WHY GOOLIDGE RESIGNED.

Last year Minister Goolidge resigned and returned from Greytown. It was given out then that Mr. Goolidge returned merely because of ill health, but it eventually was learned that he practically was forced to withdraw to save his dignity and preserve the standing of this government. Since then there has been no diplomatic connection between the two governments except through the Nicaraguan legation here.

Attaches of the legation declined today to make any comment on the situation. The new minister, Señor Hazaña, naturally refused to discuss it, as his credentials had been waived aside at the White House.

There was an air of genuine anxiety about the legation, however, and from appearances diplomats regarded the situation as grave.

The dispatch conveying the news reached the state department late last night from the American consulate at Managua, and stated that their capture had been followed almost immediately by a death sentence.

The men are William Matthews, D. W. Woods, Fred Torgerson, Frank Grigware and Lawrence J. Golden. Notice was given of an appeal. The prisoners will be taken to Leavenworth this week.

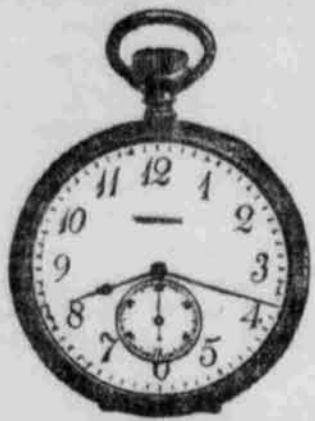
