Moving of Immense Herds of Sheep in Idaho.

ONE WRECKING AT EVANSTON.

A Few of Mrs. Stanford's Charities and Benefactions.—A House of Opals in Idaho.

Idaho Herald.—The sheep movement from Oregon and western Idaho has commenced, and already over 100,000 head have passed through the valley below here, on their July and early August. On the 22d a herd of 10,000 passed through here, and on the 23d a herd of 10,000 followed. In their way, the herds have been passing through the valley, and the sheep have been moving on to the north. The movement is a few days with something over 10,000 in their droves, and yet the movement has hardly begun. A beginning to what will follow before the season is over. Last year it was estimated that over 1,000,000 passed along the great migration route which crosses the mountain range below here. The sheep business is one of the leading industries of the Pacific northwest, being of a two fold character, as both wool and flesh command a ready sale in the eastern markets.

Idaho Falls Register.—Star valley, just south of the boundary line of the Yellowstone National park, in Wyoming, is being rapidly settled up with farmers. Fifty families have recently moved into that point from Utah and Idaho. The valley in which they have taken refuge is a rich level above the sea, and is a fine agricultural region. It is in Blaine county.

As engine 687 was pushing a number of empty freight cars into the yard three empty freight cars which had previously been pushed up to the chute started down the incline and crashed into the approaching cars in front of 687, badly wrecking three of them and tearing up the track for a distance of seventy-five feet. One car was knocked into the middle of next week.

S. F. Chronicle.—Mrs. Leland Stanford has determined to add another to her many charitable works. For some years she has been a liberal contributor to the five free kindergarten schools bearing her name in this city. Now, in order that the future maintenance of these schools shall be placed upon a permanent and enduring basis, five from all possibility of interruption, she has had a deed of trust drawn up, bequeathing to them \$100,000 as a fund, the yearly interest on which shall for all time be divided to their support. The deed was signed yesterday, and is a very lengthy document, containing some thirteen different articles, and for the administration of the trust to five trustees. Mrs. Stanford has paid \$100,000 a year to each of the five free kindergartens for several years past. The property which she has donated to the schools is the handsome fund for their maintenance is at present in the form of railroad bonds, bearing interest at the rate of five per cent, thus providing for the school easily the sum, which, which has hitherto been contributed yearly by Mrs. Stanford.

Idaho News.—The biggest treasure in Idaho, and a new kind of a mine for the "Gem of the Mountains" is in the state. Idaho Journal.—San Francisco, June 25.—The body of Nicholas Stein, who was employed at the Magdalen Asylum, and who has been missing since the 17th instant, was found in the well at the Asylum today. It is believed to have been a case of suicide.

Idaho Capital.—One of the saddest events connected with the death of Mrs. F. L. Moore was that of the return of her husband, who did not know of her death until after she was buried. He was in Texas where he was working as the inspector of the Pacific & Salt Lake Railroad. He returned Wednesday intending to leave with his family for a visit in the east for a few days.
