LOCAL BRIEFS.

Returns From East—C. E. Bowers has returned from a month's absence in the east, with his wife and son.

Visits Normal at Cedar City—State Superintendent A. C. Nelson has gone to Cedar City to visit the state normal school there.

Owls to Hold Social—Salt Lake City Next No. 61 of Owls, held a social this evening. A feature of the occasion will be an address by J. P. Menkin on "Fraternization."

Information Wanted—Ambrose Anderson, of No. 5 End Court, off Harrison st., Greendale, has been missing since he was last seen at the home of his wife, Mrs. Anderson, on Monday last.

Operators Drifted Away—Local coal dealers report the drift of operators who have drifted away from the late shut down for a month. But the operators are doing the best they can under the circumstances.

Parted and Wedded—Mrs. Clara Watrous and Louis A. Christian appeared before Judge C. B. Diehl yesterday afternoon and took out a marriage license. Thirteen days ago Mrs. Watrous secured a decree of divorce from Henry A. Watrous on the charge of non-support.

French Missionaries to Organize—The missionaries who are working in the different French speaking missions will meet next Sunday, Oct. 4, 1908, to arrange for a permanent organization. Seed Trade Increasing—Seed wholesalers are collecting empty boxes from the retailers about the state, for re-shipment back to the seed houses from which they came last winter and spring. The season is reported as very fair. The trade in Salt Lake is the great jobbing center for all this intermountain country.

New Millinery Company—Articles of incorporation of the Duquesne Millinery company were filed in the office of the county clerk yesterday afternoon. The concern is capitalized for \$10,000, and the shares \$10 each, par value. The officers named are: J. E. Sackett, president, and general manager; A. C. Allen, vice-president; T. S. Pender, secretary; W. D. Loser, treasurer. These also are directors, as is also Louis Kiskadden.

Inspected Plute Project—W. J. Leach, H. N. Hayes, W. H. Thain and W. D. Grandland, members of the state land board, secretary T. C. Callister, state engineer Caleb T. Taylor, H. E. Quinton, of the U. S. land service, have returned from an extended trip to the Plute irrigation project. The trip was made for the purpose of determining whether the project would be better to excavate with scrapers or hydraulics. Mr. Quinton will furnish the board with an opinion on the subject.

High School Athletic Meeting—The high school athletic association held its first meeting of the season yesterday, and plans for the coming year were discussed. Prof. George A. Eaton addressed the 400 students assembled in a forceful manner, and Reeve Richardson made an earnest appeal for dues. The principal speaker of the occasion was Ensign Will Barker, a graduate of the Ogdon High school, and of the United States naval academy at Annapolis. He told of his Annapolis experiences.

COUNCIL ACCEPTS BIG SIDEWALK BID

Awarding of Paving Contract to James Kennedy by Board of Works is Approved.

FOR FIFTY MILES OF WALKS

Between 500 and 600 Men to Go to Work at Once—Telephone Ordinance Passed.

Two important measures before the city council at its meeting last evening were the acceptance of the bid of James Kennedy for the completion of sidewalk extension No. 108, previously accepted by the board of works, and the passing of an ordinance regulating the revenue that the municipality shall receive from telephone companies.

The sidewalk extension is for the extreme southeastern part of the city, and includes 50 miles of paving. The contract stipulates that at least 15 miles shall be completed before the end of this year, and the remainder before Oct. 1, 1909. The contract price is \$200,000, of which amount the city will pay \$49,000, none of which, however, will have to be paid this year. Within a few days from 500 to 600 men will be at work on the project. It is said that the contract is the largest of its kind ever let at one time in the United States.

TELEPHONE ORDINANCE.

The telephone ordinance provides that after Jan. 1, 1909, each telephone company operating in this city shall take out a quarterly license and pay into the city treasury 25 cents for each telephone, whose rental is \$40 or over, and 12 1/2 cents for each instrument renting at less than \$40. Each company thus licensed shall let the municipality have the free use of 50 telephones.

Instead of the license per number of instruments, telephone companies have the alternative of paying one per cent of the gross earnings into the city treasury. If the mayor approves the ordinance, the companies have 10 days in which to accept its provisions. As the Mayor is expected to approve the ordinance, it is expected that should the ordinance become effective it would end the controversy as to whether that company has a franchise, and would grant it a lawful existence until the year 1933.

CHECK IS RETAINED.

City Auditor Alf appraised the council that he had received a check for the sum of \$7,516.61 from the Utah Light & Railway company, as its portion of the paving of First avenue, but he was of the opinion that it should be returned, as the company's doing was with the contractors rather than with the city. Several councilmen were of the opinion, however, that the check should be retained, as the city had paid the contractors in full, and should be reimbursed by the railway company.

Part of the amount named above was intended by the street railway company for the purpose of the paving of First avenue, and the remainder was for the fulfillment of the company's agreement to pay a share of the paving of the city streets on the same thoroughfare, although it no longer has tracks beyond B street on First avenue. The advertising for paving, however, had been placed in the city, and the company took up its tracks east of B street on First avenue, and it agreed to pay the assessment that had already been levied against it, just as though it had been a franchise along the entire street.

Power for the pumping station on the west side sewer will be furnished by the Utah Light and Railway company, 20 horsepower to be removed from the city and county buildings to the sewer side.

An extension of time to complete the laying of pipes, was asked for by the Public Service Heating company, from Oct. 1, 1908, to Oct. 1, 1909. The reasons advanced were that the company had been furthered by the project, and had already expended \$150,000 in the enterprise. The petition went to the municipal laws committee, and the committee expressed a fear that the company would undertake to lay pipes after streets had been paved or resurfaced.

WANT SECOND AVE RESURFACED.

F. S. Murphy and others asked that Second avenue be resurfaced, and that asphaltum rather than macadam be used for the purpose. This is the street that for a time was the boast of the administration as something great in the way of improvement. The petition was returned, as the city had no right to condition of the thoroughfare, as well as of its failure in the way of general utility.

Chief of Police Pitt sent in the names of R. M. Rockstead and Al Bates, the first as third duty sergeant, and the latter as a special policeman, and both appointments were confirmed. A petition of Stuart Newhouse, asking for the grading of Exchange place was referred to the engineering committee. In his communication Mr. Newhouse expressed the belief that the city should be as soon as improved.

Councilman Black introduced a resolution regarding the district in which peddlers and vendors may ply their vocation. The prohibited section is from South Temple to Third South, and from State street to West Temple.

MORE SALOONS ON CARPET.

The council took a recess until Thursday evening, at which time the matter of revoking or continuing the liquor licenses of McCoy & Meade 104 Commercial street, and P. F. Peterson west First South, will be considered.
