## LOCAL BRIEFS.

**Miss Purcell Promoted.**—Miss Kate Purcell has been promoted to the position held by Madame Jones with the Keith-O'Brien company, as head model.

**Easter Music Repeated.**—St. Mark's cathedral was crowded last evening, when the Easter music was repeated, and a special collection was taken for the San Francisco sufferers.

**At Los Angeles.**—The May convention of the Strangers will be held at Los Angeles as at first contemplated, although at first it was feared that the San Francisco disaster would save off the meeting.

**Contributed \$250.**—Rev. E. I. Goshen preached yesterday on the San Francisco calamity, and the great congregation contributed \$250 for the sufferers. The First Methodists contributed \$120 in a special collection taken also at the morning service in their church.

**N. E. A. Convention.**—The invitation from the Commercial club to hold the next N. E. A. convention in this city, has been referred to the executive committee, and a decision will be reached early next month. The convention was to have been held in San Francisco, but that is now impossible.

**Allen Gets Contract.**—The board of education has awarded to W. L. M. Allen the contract for building the high school gymnasium with assembly hall combined for \$29,863, and the contract for the heating and plumbing goes to the German Plumbing company for \$4,120. The building and grounds committee recommend an eight-room school building in Poplar Grove.

**Relief Society Work.**—The women of the Relief society of the "Mormon" Church shipped a car load of clothing and bedding to San Francisco Saturday night; the offering having been raised by the ladies of the Salt Lake, Esplanade, Liberty and Pioneer stakes of Zion. The consignment was sent direct to the Red Cross society at San Francisco. These contributions will amount much needed relief.

**Good Work by Hertz.**—Henry Hertz a New York traveling man, was in the district, and as soon as he could get away, started in to wake up the cities through which he passed east bound, to the necessity of extending aid. He is in Salt Lake now relating his experiences and raising subscriptions for potato shipments from Salt Lake. Mr. Hertz had to pay \$44.60 to a boatman to ferry him over to Oakland.

**Car of Medicine.**—The car of medicines and disinfectants sent from this city Saturday afternoon, was attached to Mr. Harrington's west bound special, at Ogden, and arrived at Oakland early last evening. Then another car was loaded with medicines, drugs and medical supplies yesterday, and rushed on to the government general hospital at the Presidio last night. The value of the car was \$8,000.

**NO PARDONS GRANTED.** Board Commuted One Sentence and Gave One Parole.

One commutation of sentence and one parole were granted by the state board of pardons at its regular monthly meeting on Saturday. The sentence of Jesse F. McMillan, who was sentenced to 2 years on June 11, 1905, for murder in the second degree, was commuted so as to expire on April 20, 1906, which is a little less than 10 years from the date of his sentence. Charles Kromar, who is serving three years for burglary, was granted a parole, and will be in charge of Dr. G. B. Ploutz, who will be responsible for him to the board. ## T. A. CLAWSON CHOSEN BISHOP.

Counselors Are John A. Evans  
And Lafayette T. Whitney.

### MEETING FULL OF INTEREST.

Counselors Patrick and Barton Ordained Patriarchs by Pres. Smith  
And Apostle Lyman.

In the Eighteenth ward chapel last night, before an audience which crowded the building to the doors, Elder Thos. Alfred Clawson was appointed Bishop of the ward to succeed Orson F. Whitney, lately ordained a member of the Council of the Twelve Apostles. Elders John A. Evans, formerly clerk of the ward, and Lafayette T. Whitney were appointed first and second counselors, respectively.

The occasion was full of interest to all who attended. On the stand were

Presidents Jos. F. Smith, John R. Winder, and A. H. Lund, Apostles Lyman Penrose and Whitney, Elders R. S. Wain and J. Golden Kimball, of the Council of Seventies, and most of the members of the High Council of Ensign stake.

The services were in charge of the presidency of the stake, Richard W. Young, Jos. S. Wells, and John M. Knight. President Young paid a warm tribute to Bishop Whitney and his counselors, Patrick and Barton, who had officiated the last 28 years, and as far as he knew he said it was the oldest bishopric in the Church, in which all three members had served without change. He then nominated Elders Clawson, Evans and Whitney for the bishopric and they were unanimously sustained. They were set apart in the following order: Bishop Clawson by President Jos. F. Smith, Counselor Evans by President John R. Winder, and Counselor Whitney by President A. H. Lund. President Smith made a brief address, in which he spoke of his acquaintance in Scotland and England years ago with Elders Patrick and Barton, and he paid a high tribute to their character and their long and faithful services in the Eighteenth ward. He proposed that both be ordained Patriarchs in the Ensign stake of Zion, which was carried by a unanimous vote. Elder Patrick was then ordained by President Smith and Elder Barton by Apostle Lyman. During the evening Robt. Patrick was also proposed as an alternate member of the High Council in Ensign stake, and he received the vote of all the council members present as well as of the congregation.

Concluding remarks were made by President Winder and Lyman. An excellent feeling prevailed and at the conclusion of the services most of the congregation remained to congratulate the members of the new bishopric. It was announced during the evening that the suggestion of President Smith, that in view of the big relief concert at the Tabernacle Wednesday night, the ward entertainment set for that evening as a farewell testimonial to Elders Whitney and Spencer would be postponed to Thursday evening at the same hour.

### BIOGRAPHICAL.

Thomas A. Clawson, who last evening was chosen Bishop of the Eighteenth ward, to succeed in that capacity Orson F. Whitney, recently made an Apostle, is a native of Salt Lake. He was born in this city, October 19, 1862, and is the fourth son of Cyrus B. and Margaret Gay Judd Clawson. His early school training was in the public schools, and he was variously employed for some years, first as a call boy at the Salt Lake Theater, then as a clerk boy at Z. C. M. L. and later as a clerk in the drug department of the latter institution. In 1878 he began an apprenticeship in the dental parlor of his brother, Stanley H. Clawson. He next took a three years' course at the University of Utah, then the University of Deseret, and for a short time thereafter practiced as a dentist at Brigham City and at Logan. In 1887, Bishop Clawson was graduated from the New York College of Dentistry, receiving the second highest average in his class, and was one of four members to receive honorable mention. For some years after his return home he was in partnership with his brother Stanley, and since has conducted a prosperous business of his own.

From March, 1891, to May, 1893, Dr. Clawson was on a mission to Great Britain, where for a time he presided over the London conference. Since his return home he has been actively engaged in following his chosen profession, but has never been too busy to attend strictly to his duties as an active Church member and an officer of various auxiliary organizations and in the Priesthood. On the 30th of April, 1891, Mr. Clawson was married to Miss Elizabeth Groves, and they have an interesting family of children.
