

# HE NEVER MARRIED MISS MAE C. WOOD

Senator T. C. Platt Makes Formal Denial of Allegations in Her Divorce Suit.

## SHE TRIED TO EXTRACT MONEY

Same Date of Alleged Marriage She Threatened to Sue for Breach of Promise.

New York, Oct. 4.—United States Senator Platt made formal denial today that he ever married Mae C. Wood who is suing him for divorce, alleging that she was married to the senator Nov. 2, 1901. The denial was made in an application in court today by his attorneys, asking for authority to examine certain papers in the case. The senator in his petition asserted that she had never made a claim to him of such marriage, and that on Sept. 24, 1906, he had tried to extract money from her. More than three years after the date on which she asserts she was married to him, the senator avowed, she was threatening to sue him for breach of promise, and retained a law firm of Richmond, Va., to act for her.

The senator submitted a copy of a letter from the firm, written to him in Jan., 1906, in which they announced that Miss Mae C. Wood had employed them to prosecute her claim for damages for breach of promise and alleged compulsion culminating in New York, in July, in which she asserted she was "necessarily compelled to surrender several documents written to her by Senator Platt."

In the fall of 1906, the senator asserted, Miss Wood brought two suits against him in Omaha, in which the allegations were absolutely inconsistent with her present claim of marriage. These suits were settled, and both dismissed. Both suits were dismissed.

The senator alluded to publications what purported to be a marriage certificate, which he said has been supplied by cutting away the part that should have contained the name of the man who officiated.

## MUST PAY TONNAGE DUES.

Robert Cunningham, a detective in the employ of the Denver & Rio Grande railroad, formerly police captain in Greeley, his wife in Leadville, with a bullet wound in his head. Francis Stevens cut his throat at Basell Gulch. Mrs. Jessie Alexander, wife of Dr. C. E. Alexander of Castle Rock, hanged herself and Mrs. Amelia Waters drowned herself at Durango. These three were ill health.

## WIFE MURDERER CONFESSES.

Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 4.—A man going by the name as Theodore Larson, aged 35, surrendered himself to the police today, confessing that he murdered his wife in Seattle on Aug. 12, boxed the corpse up and left it in a car. Larson states that after killing his wife he skipped across the line to Canada, but decided to return and get himself up. His story has been reported to the Seattle police for investigation.

## FOUND GUILTY.

Engineer and Conductor of Train That Collided, Killing Ten Persons.

Hartford, Conn., Oct. 4.—Engineer James Wilson and Conductor James Maroney, charged with manslaughter, were today found guilty in the criminal superior court and sentenced to six months each in jail. Wilson and Maroney were in charge of the passenger train which, on July 23, collided with a work train in this city, killing 10 persons and injuring 46.

# BUMPED INTO ROOSEVELT BOAT

Steamer Fred Hartwig, While Racing With the Alton, Struck The Mississippi.

## LICENSE ORDERED SUSPENDED

President Hinman Was Throw Against Wall of His State Room With a Good Deal of Force.

Elysville, Ind., Oct. 4.—United States Inspector of Hulls, Williams, of the local port, this afternoon received a telegram signed by President Roosevelt, directing that the license for the steamer Fred Hartwig be suspended by the Pittsburg delegation in the present case, to be immediately suspended. ## THEODORE ROOSEVELT

The steamer Fred Hartwig's home port is Cairo and it is inspected at Elysville. Inspector Williams of the Elysville district issued telegraphic orders, rightly ordering the suspension of the license of the captain of the steamer Fred Hartwig for 90 days by direction of President Roosevelt. The order came from the delegation which the Fred Hartwig was racing with the steamer Alton, thereby endangering the Mississippi on which President Roosevelt was traveling. The Fred Hartwig and the Alton accompanied the Mississippi flotilla down the river. The Hartwig carried the Pittsburg delegation.

THE OFFENSE.

Memphis, Tenn., Oct. 4.—According to a special dispatch received yesterday from Cain, Ill., the incident which resulted

in President Roosevelt requesting the suspension of the officer in charge of the steamer Fred Hartwig occurred a short distance below that city yesterday. When the boats composing the flotilla escorting the president left Cairo, the dispatch states, the steamer Alton, having aboard the St. Louis delegation, had the position immediately assumed by the Fred Hartwig, president Hinman aboard and the Hartwig, while endeavoring to overtake the president from the Alton, bumped into the president's boat with great force causing it to steer and roughly jar those aboard, the president being thrown against the wall of his state room with considerable force. This caused the action to be taken on board the Mississippi by the dispatches and in endeavoring to get off the path of the Hartwig, a serious accident might have resulted.

## \$65,000 APARTMENT BUILDING FOR FIFTH SOUTH.



"THE BOTHWELL" WILL ACCOMMODATE OVER 100 PEOPLE

Above is the front elevation of a new apartment building to be erected on the premises 237 west Fifth south street, facing north. The structure will be three stories and basement, 28 feet front and 165 ft. deep, and contain 129 rooms in 22 suites, with 22 bath rooms, so that over 100 people can be accommodated. The material will be yellow brick from the Bamberger yards, with brown stone trimmings, and a feature of the construction is to be ice chests in the walls to be reached by ice men from the hallway, so they need not enter the apartments at all. The cost of the apartment house will be \$65,000, and the name, "The Bothwell." W. W. Hall is the owner of the property, and Architect William Carroll has just completed the plans. Building will require about four months.
