WASHINGTON, Dec. 2.—There are indications of a severe struggle in the ranks over the sugar scheme of the Wilson bill if it is not modified in the House. A prominent southern senator and today, senators from all the states which produce sugar, including those from the two sugar producing districts of the south, and those from the best sugar producing states of the west and north—Nebraska, Kansas, and California would vote against the change in the bill. The plan of graduated reductions in the bill, so far, would prevail in the middle sugar districts. Indiana, Michigan, and Ohio, which were voted, were never in favor of the heavy plan, but preferred an industry. They would not, however, be protecting in the sense intended by McMillan, but would give him a chance to do his best. The bill as now stands in the Senate will be voted on Wednesday next.

SENATOR JONES.

SAYS HIS EXPERIENCE AND VIEWS ARE
