IRRIGATING A YOUNG ORCHARD

The ordinary plan of irrigating young trees and one often practised by farmers who have irrigated wheat and alfalfa for many years is to run the water down the row, flooding the surface about each tree and often wetting the trunk of the tree to a hight of six inches. After irrigation the furrows or ditches are left untouched, the idea being to save the labor of making new ditches for the next irrigation. ing new ditches for the next irrigation. As a first result the soil packs and bakes about the tree and cracks open up to let out not only the moisture applied but to sap out the moisture and life from the young roots. As a second result of such careless irrigation the bark about the trunks of the trees soaked by the flooding be-comes scalded and peels off, thus ex-posing the combium, or tender sap

comes scalded and peels off, thus ex-posing the combium, or tender sap wood of the tree, and sunscald results, borers get in, the tree is said to be blighted and seldom survives the first season. This picture is not overdrawn— in fact, it falls short of portraying the lamentable condition of hundreds of young orchards seen in the west every summer There is a proper way of irriyoung orchards seen in the west every summer. There is a proper way of irri-gating fruit trees and it is very simple. Deep furrows should be run close to the trees on each side, being careful not to throw dirt high about the trunks, as that will make the bark tender. The dirt should be thrown to-ward the tree. A small stream, one that will barely creep along the fur-row, will penetrate the soil better than a large stream with rapid flow. Special Correspondence. If crops are plant-ed in the orchard so as to preclude the use of the harrow, the best plan is to run lengthwise of the furrow with a cultivator, throwing in as much fine dirt as possible. As a last resort, when horse cultivation cannot be given, the ground three feet each side of the tree should be pulverized with a hoe and rake. The entire work of furrowing and cultivating should be repeated at each irrigation.
