So important is the matter of a stand-ard screw for gun fittings and other ac-curate work that a committee of the Brit-ish war office has spent four years upon the problem. A special lathe-the only one-of its kind in the world-has been con-structed, and the screw at last produced is regarded as a marvel of scientific ac-curacy. It is three feet long, with no deviation in any part of more than one ten-thousandth part of an inch.
