DARING HOLDUP ON WEST TEMPLE.

Masked Men Enter Robinson's Drug Store and Relieve Clerk of \$88.

CASE IN HANDS OF POLICE.

Robbers Fled Across the Street and Disappeared in an Alley—Are Still at Large.

Two masked men entered L. A. Robinson's drug store, on the corner of Market and West Temple streets last night about midnight, just as the night clerk was counting up the cash preparatory to closing the store for the night, and, with the assistance of an ugly-looking gun, compelled the clerk to throw up his hands and stand with his face towards the wall while they cleaned out his pockets and also the cash drawer. They secured \$14.50 from the clerk and \$78.50 from the drawer, a total of \$93. The men then fled across West Temple street and entered an alley and have not yet been captured. The clerk says that he was at a desk in the rear of the store beside the prescription case counting the money when he heard the men enter the store. He looked up only to see a gun in his face and to hear the command "Hands up!" He obeyed without delay and was then told to turn his face to the wall. He was covered with a gun by one man while the other rifled his pockets and the cash drawer, taking all the money in sight. They then marched the clerk in the room back of the prescription case and told him not to move until they left the place. As soon as they were gone he ran to the walk and gave the alarm. He then telephoned the police station and the patrol wagon came to the scene with Detective Chase and Burt and Patrolmen Corliss, Clark and Moore in it. The officers at once commenced work on the case. Several people saw the robbers run across the street and into an alley, but they did not dare follow them.

IMPROVEMENT IN BUSINESS HELD.

Unfavorable Weather Has Had The Effect of Somewhat Retarding Development.

COLLECTIONS ARE MORE PROMPT

Manufacturing Returns Satisfactory—Building Operations Expand—Capital and Labor on Good Terms.

New York, April 7.—R. G. Dun & Co.'s Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say: "Recent gains in the volume of business are fully maintained, but further improvement is somewhat retarded by unfavorable weather in some sections; buyers are still arriving at the leading cities, placing additional spring orders, and most full lines that have been opened are meeting with an encouraging reception, despite occasional requests for extensions. Collections are more prompt on the whole."

"Manufacturing returns are all that could be desired, building operations expand as the season advances, and agricultural prospects are better than normal. There is little friction between capital and labor, most new wage scales being arranged on the old basis, and in some cases advances are granted, while the number of unemployed is steadily decreasing. Freight traffic is very heavy, some congestion occurring, and railway earnings in March were 9.2 per cent larger than last year. Foreign commerce at this port is very heavy, exports for last week exceeding the same week in 1904 by \$1,590,709, while imports increased \$1,975,296. Increased activity is noted in the hide market."

"Commerce failures this week in the United States are 232, against 244 last week, 235 the preceding week and 235 the corresponding week last year. "Failures in Canada number 23, against 32 last week, 19 in the preceding week and 89 last year."


