

## WORLD'S FAIR MATTERS.

Ogden Bankers Expected to Make Loans to the Amount of \$10,000.  
—Satisfactory Progress.

A meeting of the World's Fair commissioners for Utah, was held at President Chapman's office last night. All the members were present. Arrangements were made to close up the negotiations for loans from the clearing house banks of this city today. The matter of securing loans to the amount of \$10,000 from Ogden bankers was definitely discussed. Assurance was given that there would be a strong response from the source.

Several communications were read, received and read. The Ogden Terriers' Association of Utah, asking that proper steps be taken to secure a good educational exhibit for the Territory, their communication that they had sent to the commissioners in the southern part of the Territory, was read. A telegram from the Indians to take to the World's Fair, providing the amount of the contribution could be settled.

A letter was received from Director General Davis of the World's Fair Commission in Chicago, officially accepting the Utah commissioners' donation and file.
