WASHINGTON, 6.-Of the ten dollar refunding certificates, there were sold by the Treasury Department \$40,512,750. For the purpose of making sale 799 Government officers, mostly postmasters, were designated by the Secretary of the Treasury as depositors, but 509 of that number, however, qualified by filing bonds, and through whom sales were made to the amount of \$28,569,200. One hundred and eighty-four National Banks were designated for the purpose, but only 76 qualified, selling \$1,197,670. The balance, \$10,245,849 were sold by the United States Treasurer. The assistant Treasurer's accounts of all depositories have been closed and the entire proceeds of the certificates sold by them have been deposited in the Treasury without the loss of a single cent.

Thirty-five million eight hundred and sixty thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars in refunding certificates have been presented for conversion into four per cent bonds to date.

Consul Lord, of Ningpo, China, grain crops in the province of Che Kyng, that from April to the middle of June, the weather was wet and cold. Such was the intensity of the heat that the canals, which are largely relied upon for irrigation, dried up, and everything became parched. Should the drought continue much longer, the Consul thought the grain would be wholly destroyed. The cotton crop had also suffered greatly. The province of Che Kyng has an area of about 40,000 square miles and a population of over 26,000,000.

The Ameloward Croadurer here writes that in the Treasury Department there has been no change in the movement of gold. It still continues to accumulate in our vaults, whilst the amount of certicates outstanding remains nearly stationary. There is really no demand for gold, as it is less convenient than notes to handle.
